Weaver's bill would curtail herbicide use

Rep. Jim Weaver, D-Ore., has introduced a bill which he said last week would "eliminate the unnecessary use of herbicides on federal forest lands and create hundreds of new jobs in vegetation management."

Weaver said his bill would require the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management to give preference to methods which would "yield the maximum number of jobs per dollar expended" for vegetation management.

"If it were up to me, I would halt all aerial spraying of herbicides because I have never been convinced of their effectiveness in promoting the growth of our Douglas Fir over the long term," Weaver said.

Highway weed spray concerns local resident

The state Highway Department is spraying weeds along Highway 26 this week and a local resident hopes families along the route will make studies to determine the herbicide's effects.

Two Oregon State University scientists will visit Sandy May 19, under the sponsorship of the Sandy Community School, to discuss the effects of herbicides. To provide data about spray drift and health problems, area residents are asked to keep a record.

Jude Jensen said that Dr. Jim Witt, OSU biochemist and toxicologist, has provided a list of information necessary before someone can contest herbicide spraying in the courts.

Families should note the date of the spraying and weather conditions, including wind direction and velocity. Geographical location in relation to the spraying should also be noted, including distance and whether you are up or downwind.

If any member of the family shows signs of illness following the spraying within one to three days, make a tabular list of symptoms and their duration and see your doctor.

Finally, note plants in the corridor between your home and the spray, before spraying, and any unusual plant symptoms after spraying.

Witt will be joined by Dr. Sheldon Wagner, a toxicologist at Good Samaritan Hospital in Corvallis, who is attempting to start a statewide program of physicians to test for herbicides in the blood.
