Forest sites get by with less service

Recreation sites in the national forests of the Pacific Northwest will operate at reduced levels of service this summer because of budget reductions.

A few campgrounds and other facilities will be closed, but more likely, visitors will find reduced services and requests from ranger district personnel that some services be provided by the visitor.

For example, garbage collection in some campgrounds may be intermittent or non-existent and people will be asked to pack garbage back home. Where overnight camping fees are charged, services should be near normal. But elsewhere, services and conveniences will be few or non-existent.

Local administrators will decide what measures are needed to meet their budget restrictions. Signs will be posted in most developed sites to explain how the public can help keep their facilities clean and operating.

Funds are short for maintenance and construction in all aspects of recreation, including trails, wilderness, backcountry management and firewood gathering.

One way to meet the challenge of keeping national forest areas and facilities from degrading is to ask people to volunteer their services. A greater effort will be made to get groups and individuals to volunteer this summer.

Unemployment fraud rising in Oregon

Unemployment insurance fraud continues to be a risky business in Oregon, according to figures from the state Employment Division.

During the first three months of 1981, 679 claimants were ordered to repay a total of \$252,000 in fraudulently claimed benefits. Of that number, 133 were detected when division personnel checked with employers and found the claimants were not actually applying for work where they said they were.

In 14 other cases, circuit court judges throughout the state ordered \$9,721 in restitution payments after division fraud investigators revealed that the defendants had been working while drawing benefits.

All money recaptured by the division was returned to a trust fund to help hold down taxes for Oregon employers.

Party honors 95th birthday
