

## County officials refute farm claims

Clackamas County officials last week refuted a recent claim by 1000 Friends of Oregon that counties are subverting Oregon's farm land protection. The county's message was delivered to the State Senate Environment and Land Use Committee.

County Counsel Scott Parker and Environmental Services Assistant Director Ardis Stevenson rebutted the charge by presenting the senators with their own "Study of an Invalid Study,"

Clackamas County's analysis of the 1000 Friends report on county application of state standards for farmland.

The 1000 Friends' study is fatally flawed, wrong and should not be a factor in Senate consideration of proposed land use legislation, Parker told the committee.

Clackamas County and representatives of other counties at the Salem hearing took particular exception to 1000 Friends' allegation that "the performance of

county elected officials can only be characterized as scandalous," Stevenson said.

The 1000 Friends study which caused the uproar was presented to the same Senate committee two weeks earlier.

Parker said the 1000 Friends report is based on flawed assumptions, faulty methods, misuse of census data and a short-range view of long-range efforts.

The county analysis, produced at the urging of the

Association of Oregon Counties, concludes that the 1000 Friends study "focuses on a few trees without looking at the whole forest."

"This attack on how counties handle exclusive farm use areas, comes on the heels of the announcement from the Oregon State University Extension Service that for the first time Clackamas County's annual agricultural income has exceeded \$100 million," Parker said.

## Former Sandy resident named to board

A former Sandy High School librarian has been reappointed to the Oregon State Library Board of Trustees by Gov. Vic Atiyeh.

The reappointment of Nina Cleveland of Salem is subject to Oregon Senate confirmation. A member of the board since 1977, Cleveland's new term will be for four years beginning July 1.

Duties of the seven-member board, a policy-making body for the state library, including appointing the state librarian, formulating general policies for the state library, and extending and improving library services.

Cleveland has been a lobbyist for the Oregon Library

Association in the 1973, 1975 and 1977 Legislative sessions and from 1967-69 was clerk in the Oregon Senate. A former part-time teacher, Mrs. Cleveland was an English teacher and librarian at Sandy High School from 1942-44.

She was president of the League of Women Voters, Salem, and served three two-year terms on the State Board of the League of Women Voters, one as legislative chairperson.

A native of Pendleton, she

is a graduate of Hermiston High School, studied at Oregon State University and graduated with a bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon. She has also studied at Oregon College of Education.

## State archivist set for pioneer meet

David C. Duniway, who for many years has been the archivist of the state of Oregon, will speak to the Oregon History Series Group Monday, April 27, at 2 p.m. in the Beaver Room of the Oregon Historical Society, 1230 S.W. Park Ave.,

Duniway is the grandson of the famed women's suffragist, Abigail Jane Scott Duniway.

He has collected artifacts throughout his life, formerly for his work and now for self

satisfaction. His home is a museum displaying thousands of interesting tokens from pioneer days.

The title of his address is "The Migration of 1852." His ancestors participated in this life-straining ordeal.
