Kelso balloon visits Canada after release

When a seven-year-old Washougal, Wash., girl looked for her cat around the woodpile early last month, she got a surprise, but she wasn't alone.

What she found was a balloon that had been set off at the first birthday celebration at Kelso Grade School March 10. That day, students and teachers set off more than 250 colorful balloons, each with a note attached asking its finder to let the student, named on the tag, know where the balloon came to earth.

By Monday this week, seven balloons had been returned and the range of their flights stretched all the way from Shalimar Drive, two miles from the school, to Three Hills, Alberta, Canada

— 650 miles northeast of the school.

The seven-year-old girl, Jo Dee Holterman, was not the only Washougal-area resident who found a balloon. The majority of those which made it out of the Kelso area and were returned went to the Washougal area, across the Columbia River almost directly north of Sandy.

That is, except for the balloon with Angie Rudisill's name attached which ventured all the way into Canada. It was found by T.W. Davis two days after its release. In a note accompanying the found balloon, Davis surmised that the 650-700 miles traveled in two days was "faster than the Canadian Postal Service."

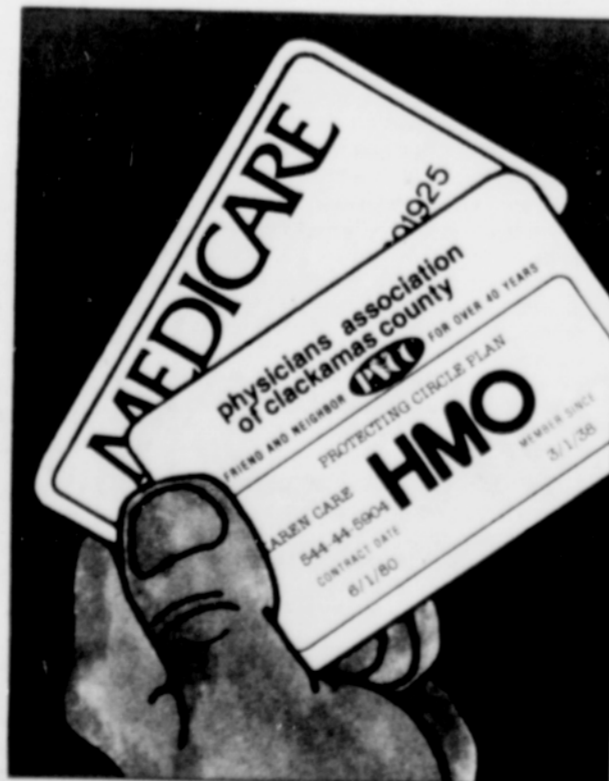
