tree, Silver Threads students and local elementary school classes which have "adopted" residents to help with the celebration.

Oregonians want prisoners staying put

Oregonians want to keep the state's prisoners in prison. And they want to make sure the state's leaders know it.

Reducing the number of prisoners in state correctional facilities before they have served their full sentence was opposed by 90 percent of those responding to a Governor's Listening Post survey earlier this year.

More than 3,200 ballots were filled out in the February survey. More than 2,800 respondents opposed reducing the number of prisoners before serving full sentence, while 331 said they favored the idea.

Listening Post coordinator

Paul Phillips said participation in this second Listening Post survey increased 23 percent over the earlier survey in late 1980 concerning child care. Approximately 2,500 took part in that survey.

Gov. Vic Atiyeh said, "The growing number of Oregonians taking part in the Listening Post Program survey is indicative of their desire to become involved in government policy making. When given the opportunity to become involved, citizens of Oregon enthusiastically respond."

Although not scientifically conducted, survey ballots were sent to and received in proportional number to

population from each of Oregon's 36 counties, Phillips said.

He said survey respondents were closely divided on regional correctional facilities, opposing them 51 to 49 percent. By a two-to-one margin (67 to 31 percent) those who answered the survey opposed a regional correctional facility in their community but approved (57 to 43 percent) of a new correctional facility in Marion County.

Those who favored a new Marion County facility supported construction of that facility to serve a larger future prison population, rather than a facility which would alleviate current over-

crowding in the state prison population.

Bonding was listed as the favorite method of paying for the new facility, followed by income tax, sales tax and property tax.

Respondents opposed, 58 to 42 percent, funds being spent on parole and probation, but favored, 52 to 48 percent, more money being spent on training facilities for state correctional institution residents.

In addition, those who answered the survey were

asked to complete an evaluation on the state Employment Division.

A total of 618 said they had dealt with the division in the past six months.

Phillips figured, "We can deduce that the majority of those answering the evaluation have or are either looking for work or applying for unemployment insurance. Those answering also felt the service they received was only fair, good, poor and excellent, in order of preference."

Hospice open house slated

Mount Hood Hospice will host an open house 2-4:30 p.m., Tuesday, May 19, at the volunteer health-care group's new office above Coast to Coast in Sandy's Heritage Square.

Governor Vic Atiyeh has declared May 17-24 as Oregon Hospice Week.

The new local hospice group is organizing to provide a new home-care support network for terminally ill patients at home.

Hospice team members primarily will be professionals and semi-professionals who volunteer their time. They will work closely with hospitals and family doctors to provide physical and emotional support for patients at home.

Projected start-up date for area service is Jan. 1, 1982.

Volunteers and donations are sought for the non-profit neighbor-to-neighbor aid program.
