

# Industrial death toll down

Oregon's industrial death toll dropped to its lowest point in 37 years in 1980.

A total of 88 on-the-job fatalities were recorded last year by the Workers' Compensation Department. That compares to 137 in 1979 and 162 in 1943, the first year such figures were available from the department.

Logging, manufacturing and construction industries recorded the highest number of work-related deaths, while motor vehicle accidents led fatality causes.

Clackamas County had just three work-related deaths in 1980, compared to seven the previous year.

Lane County led all Oregon counties with 12.

Eighteen people were killed in logging accidents in the state in 1980; 13 in other manufacturing jobs; 12 in

construction; eight doing government work; seven in wholesale trade; six in agriculture and forestry; and six in retail trade.

Auto accidents led the way with 22 deaths, followed by accidents where people were struck or knocked against something, 16; caught in or under something, 14; electrocuted, 7; killed in falls, 6; by plane crash, 6; by heart attacks, 6; and by homicide, 3.

"We're pleased with the sharp downturn in worker deaths, but we're still very concerned about the continuing number of deaths caused by traffic accidents," said Accident Prevention administrator Darrel Douglas.

"We think one of the best ways to cut down on such work deaths is to urge employers to make the use of seat belts mandatory in their company safety policy," he added.

## The Doctor Says

# Arthritis can plague the feet

Most people associate the pain of arthritis with hand deformities.

But pain and disability can occur as frequently, if not more, in the feet, according to the Arthritis Foundation.

"About two-thirds of those with rheumatoid arthritis have symptoms in their feet," said Stephen F. Birkovich Jr., committee chairman for Oregon's chapter of the foundation. "Other forms of arthritis, including gout, osteoarthritis and ankylosing spondylitis (a spinal arthritis) can also affect the feet."

Proper footwear is frequently the only treatment needed for foot problems. Shoes should be purchased with comfort as the first priority

rather than fashion.

"If the latest shoe style is wrong for you feet, don't buy it," Birkovich warned. "Shoes should allow the toes to lie straight and should have a fairly low heel."

Other characteristics of shoes considered important to foot health are that they do not compress the toes; they leave room for toe action; they clasp the heel reasonably firmly from side to side; and that they hold the foot across the instep.

The aim of foot treatment is to maximize comfort and minimize the development of deformity. In addition to proper footwear, other methods of treatment include local heat, padding to cushion and pro-

tect, exercises and surgery.

"When foot disorders are approached properly, the great majority of patients can expect some or even complete relief from pain and disability," Birkovich said. "When they're neglected, the consequences can be very serious."

What is true for foot problems is equally true for arthritis in general. Early treatment can make all the difference in preventing pain and deformity.

## Low interest home loans are available

Rural, low-interest home loans are now available through the Farmers Home Administration, under its housing program.

The funds must be used for critical improvements such as foundations, sanitation, weatherization or other repairs needed to remove health and safety hazards.

Loans of not more than \$1,500 may be made for 10 years; loans of \$1,500 to \$2,500 may be written for 15 years; and loans of \$2,500 to \$7,500 can be made for 20 years. All loans will be secured by a promissory note and, in some cases, a mortgage would be required.

All loans, regardless of the amount, will be written a one percent interest.

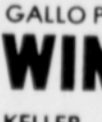

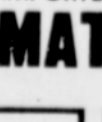
