

Eligibility review set for Social Security

Many people who receive Social Security payments will have their cases re-examined in the near future to make certain they continue to be eligible for benefits.

Social Security is required to review most disability cases at least once every three years, to determine if a person is still disabled.

As an important first step in making the required reviews, the Social Security Administration is significantly increasing the number of continuing disability investigations it makes. Nearly 350,000 cases will be reviewed during the rest of this fiscal year. Next year, more than 500,000

cases will be reviewed. The initial case reviews will be selected based on studies which show those cases most likely to result in recovery. These first investigations will provide additional data which should indicate other types of cases which should be reviewed soon.

Social Security disability benefits can only be made to people who have a severe physical or mental impairment expected to prevent them from working for at least 12 months or more or to result in death.

People who are found to no longer be disabled during the reviews will have the opportunity to appeal.

Times will be Monday through Thursday from 7 to 10 p.m. Friday will be an all-day seminar, 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturday's session will be 9:30 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The church bus will provide transportation. Registration for the group rate should be completed by June 1. There is a \$10 discount per person with the rate, \$20 for a couple. Cost of the seminar is \$35 per person and \$55 per couple.

Age limit for the seminar is 15. However, upon written request, 13 and 14 year olds may be admitted if accompanied by their parents.

Local partition requested

The Clackamas County hearings officer will consider a lot major partition for property in the Baty Road area this Wednesday at a 9 a.m. hearing in Oregon City.

Paul Hansen is requesting the partition. A non-forest use has been approved and access would be via an existing easement, less than 20 feet wide which connects with E. Sylvan Drive.

A waiver may be necessary to allow access over an easement less than 20 feet wide.

The property under question is off the east side of Baty Road, approximately one-

half mile north of its intersection with S.E. Coalman Road, in the Sandy area.

At Thursday evening's 7 p.m. session with the hearings officer at the Clackamas County Courthouse, James L. Emerson will seek a non-farm use permit to create a two-acre lot for a residence that will not be used in conjunction with a farm use. The remaining property would remain in farm use.

The property is on the west side of S.E. Baty Road, approximately one-quarter mile north of S.E. Coalman Road.

Also on Thursday's agenda, Leroy Keith and Mary Ann Manley will seek a temporary permit to use a mobile home as a residence for caretakers to help do farm work. The property is located at the western end of Jarl Road, west of Sandy.

These applications are available for inspection from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Clackamas County Planning Division.

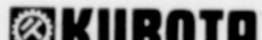
