## By ambulance attendant

# Quick action saves baby's life

The quick actions of an Alpine ambulance driver saved the life of a baby born two months prematurely on Thursday, May 17.

Russel James McMahan, weighing 2 lb. 11 oz., is in stable condition at Emanuel Hospital in Portland.

His mother, Terri McMahan of Eagle Creek, began to feel the contractions at 3 a.m., and attempted to leave for the University of Oregon Medical Center at 1:30 p.m. when her contractions were two minutes apart. She instead went to the Sandy Fire Department, who called Alpine Ambulance service.

Paramedic Ray Hartney responded to the call and, when he realized she would not make it to the Medical Center, set up the ambulance for birth procedures.

Three minutes later, the baby's head was stuck in the birth canal, and Hartney had to deliver it by manipulation. When the baby was delivered, it was "blue," he

said, from lack of oxygen.

Hartney immediately began giving mouth-to-mouth-nose resuscitation to the child and continued until they reached Gresham Community Hospital. An APGER (Apparent Pulse Grimace Activity and Respiration) reading was taken to determine how well the newborn baby was doing and he had a "one reading", which is near death, according to Dr. Gary Monday. Hartney continued mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and within five minutes the APGER raised to five. Normal APGER is seven. Monday assisted, cutting the umbilical cord.

All three were transported to Emanuel Hospital via Life Flight helicopter, while Hartney continued resuscitation.

McMahan stayed at Emanuel for two days, but her son, who now weighs 2 lbs., 11 oz., will remain for six weeks.

"That was a close call," said McMahan, who has three other children.

McMahan was impressed with Hartney's quick life-saving reactions.

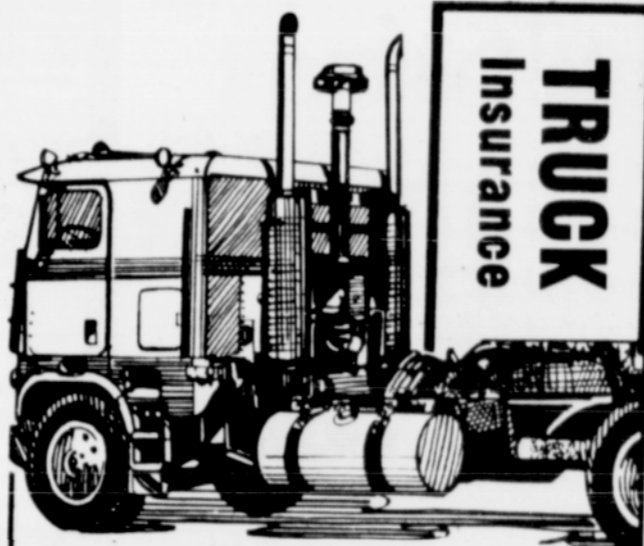
"I thought that was fantastic," she said. "I thought

for sure I was going to make it (to the University)."

Hartney had delivered a baby once before, but never a two-month premature,

breech baby.

"I feel fortunate to be one capable to do that," said Hartney. "I feel God was with me."
