Computer enhances recording system

When school opens next fall, the data processing department at the Clackamas Education Service District (ESD) will be on line with new computer hardware to enhance the ESD's student records and attendance system.

The new Data General M 600 system will bring a "much higher level of technical support to the schools that use the system," according to ESD data processing director Bob Rintoul.

The system will serve two

dozen high schools and junior highs across Clackamas County, including Sandy High.

The main advantages of the system will be speed and accuracy in storing and retrieving student records, Rintoul noted.

The ESD's data processing department already maintains student records for schools across the county. These records include grades, attendance and the student competency records Oregon now requires for high school graduation.

In the past, many of these records had to be sent to the ESD on paper, where the information was transferred to computer cards, then entered into the computer. The process required time and had to be done in batches.

The new system connects the ESD computer with terminals located in the schools by telephone line. Now, information on student grades, attendance or competencies can be entered and retrieved by local school personnel using these terminals.

The system also has several levels of security built in so schools can decide who can retrieve or enter different kinds of information. For example, the school administration may be able to call up certain kinds of information while a school counselor can get other kinds of data about a student.

The system also includes a high speed printer, capable of printing 600 lines a minute to reduce the time schools have to wait when they need a great deal of printed information.

The system is part of a project that began nearly three years ago. In the fall of 1978, a review committee drafted a set of recommendations for upgrading the computer system the ESD was using at the time. The committee was made up of representatives of the school districts using the ESD's data processing system.

The plans came back with a stamp of approval and were adopted by the ESD board in the spring of 1980.

New rule outlines system for occupational license

A permanent rule establishing conditions and limitations for occupational driver's licenses has been adopted by the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division. At the same time, the new rule outlines requirements for getting such a license.

Each year, DMV issues more than 5,000 occupational licenses to drivers whose licenses have been suspended for one reason or another. These licenses allow suspended drivers to drive to and from work or, in some cases, on the job.

According to Jim Hunter, manager of DMV's Driver Services Branch, the rule recognizes that even though a driver has lost his or her license for a good reason, loss of a job should not be part of the consequences if it can be avoided without undue risk to the public.

"We also recognize that, especially in the agricultural, timber and transportation industries, a

driver who loses a license to drive can lose a livelihood." Occupational licenses, Hunter said, offer these drivers "a little breathing room," but prohibit driving that is not work-related.

These licenses "channel driving to times when people are most likely to be on their best driving behavior—when they're driving in connection with work or business," he added.

Adoption of the permanent administrative rule formalizes practices which have been in effect for some time. Although the rule "allows us to provide limited driving privileges," Hunter said, "it also puts drivers on notice that these restricted licenses cannot be abused.

Occupational licenses are granted for most types of license suspension. Driving is generally restricted to no more than 12 hours per day, and to those days on which the driver normally works.

An unemployed driver can

get a 30-day occupational license to look for work. These licenses restrict driving to eight hours a day, five days a week.

To get an occupational license, most drivers submit an application, a non-refundable \$25 fee and have their insurance company submit a special insurance filing.

Drivers convicted of driving while intoxicated face stricter requirements for occupational licenses, including recommendations from the convicting judge and a rehabilitation program. Any type of alcohol-related driving offense after an occupational license is issued means revocation of the occupational license.

Driving outside the restrictions placed on the license—time of day, day of week—also results in a revocation of the license and a one-year wait before application can be made for another license.
