

Sandy firm fined \$400

A Sandy firm has recently been assessed a civil penalty for violation of the Oregon Homebuilders Law by the Builders Board of the State Department of Commerce.

A \$400 civil penalty was assessed against Sandy Floorcovering, Inc., for contracting to install floorcovering in a residence while not registered.

The Builders Board was established in 1972 to register all persons who perform work on residences. As of June 1, 15,363 builders were actively registered in Oregon.

Non-registered builders are subject to civil penalties up to \$1,000 for each offense. Since its establishment, the Board has assessed approximately \$300,000 in civil penalties.

Book review

Story of David has poetic overtones

It is not surprising to find that Charles Gulston, author of "David, Shepherd and King," has also written poetry.

He has written the old story of David's tragedies and triumphs in a sensitive, imaginative style that suggests poetry.

In the course of history, from Moses to Churchill, a man has risen to match the

hour. David owes his immortality not to the fact that he raised a people to the zenith of their power, but to his songs of triumph and despair that have reached out to every man in every age.

David had the ability to adapt to totally different situations. He had a superbly balanced personality — the depth of his emotions was matched by exceptional mental powers. He was as capable of winning an individual to his side as he was

of administering the affairs of state.

Up to the age of 50, he climbed steadily in triumph with God's assistance. First there were the shepherd years, then the fugitive years and finally, the kingly years. They were divided in two; before and after Bathsheba.

His last 20 years, after Bathsheba, wrung this cry from him, "My life is spent with grief, and my years with sighing." But God did

not reject him and David accepted divine chastening with humble resignation.

The book includes photographs, diagrams, a chronology of David's life and an index.

Gulston, who was a journalist in South Africa for 25 years, has also written "Jerusalem: The Tragedy and the Triumph," "No Greater Heritage," and "Eternity is for Every Man."

Weaver blasts timber industry

An amendment which would have restored \$20 million to reforestation funds is dead.

"The timber industry, after intensive lobbying, has succeeded in reversing the House Agriculture Committee's approval of my amendment, offered and passed last week, to take \$20 million from an expanded road budget to restore a \$20 million cut in reforestation fund," Rep. Jim Weaver, D-Ore., said last week.

"My amendment would have saved 32 million tree seedlings from destruction," Weaver added, in remarks made after a heated debate before the House Agriculture Committee.

"The timber industry's arrogant disregard for the future of our National Forests is a national disgrace," Weaver said.

"Their efforts to cut reforestation, in order to provide more federal subsidies for roads, goes hand in hand with their desire to liquidate the last of the old growth trees on our National Forests as fast as possible. Their actions are a national disgrace, and a threat to the future of our Northwest timber economy," he added.

The Agriculture Committee decision, reverses a decision made last week to adopt the Weaver Amendment which would have transferred \$20 million from the Forest Service Road budget to the Reforestation Budget.

Weaver pushed for the amendment in order to guarantee full reforestation of our federal forests.

"We presently have 32 billion board feet of sold, but uncut, timber. This massive volume of available timber far exceeds the normal inventory. At a time when all budgets have been pared, it is ridiculous to extend the highly developed Forest Service road system into marginally productive undeveloped areas," Weaver added.

"The Republicans, who cry the loudest about getting the federal government out of the free enterprise system, have orchestrated the passage of a massive government subsidy for the timber industry by providing

more federally-funded roads into these marginally-productive areas," Weaver said. "The existing road budget was already inflated and out of proportion."

"I am saddened, shocked and ashamed that any committee in the United States Congress could sacrifice these seedlings and the proper reforestation of our National Forests because a few greedy, short-sighted timber companies didn't get everything they wanted in the Forest Service budget. It is simply a national disgrace," Weaver said.

Weaver pointed that the Northwest would not only lose 32 million seedlings, but also countless jobs in the reforestation and timber management industries.

Streambank protection work begins July 1

A contract for bank protection along the Sandy river near Brightwood was recently awarded by the Portland District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The right bank of the Sandy River, about two miles west of Brightwood, will be stabilized under a contract let to Terra Construction, Shady Cove, for \$205,980 on May 14.

The contract calls for excavation of about 9,000 cubic yards of material from the

river's bank, reinforcement of the area with 4,090 cubic yards of fill material and riprapping with 9,240 cubic yards of rock. This will help prevent riverbank erosion and stop the Sandy River's meandering in the Sleepy Hollow area.

The Sandy River work will be done from July 1 to Sept. 1 to avoid disturbing the movement or spawning of fish in the river. Work is scheduled for completion by mid-October 1981.
