Job sharing plan

County ESD approves new program

The Clackamas County Education Service District Board last week approved a job sharing program and the purchase of new printing equipment.

The board also heard reports on a revised ESD table of organization, on ESD resolution programs for 1982-83 and on summer continuation programs for handicapped students in the ESD's program for the mentally retarded and developmentally delayed.

The job sharing plan, recommended by ESD superintendent Bob Burns, was approved. Under the plan, two employees share one job with each employee

receiving a prorated share of the salary. Employee benefits are shared the same way. The job sharing requests must be approved by the ESD administration, however.

The low bidder for the printing equipment, an automated offset system for the ESD printing department, was A.M. International Inc. The bid was \$46,691 for the system, which will replace a photo duplicating machine the ESD has leased for several years.

The new equipment is a more cost effective way to meet increasing printing re-

quests from the 28 school districts in Clackamas County served by ESD, Burns said.

The board reviewed a new table of organization for ESD departments and personnel. The major changes would be in the Curriculum, Instruction and Evaluation Department. The department provides help in career and vocational education, testing and assessment, counseling, attendance, school standards and the talented and gifted programs.

Changes are intended to "place more emphasis on serving small school districts in Clackamas Coun-

ty, schools that often don't have the specialized curriculum assistance available to larger districts," Burns said.

In order to comply with new laws regarding the handicapped, the ESD will run a summer instruction program for about one-third of the 150 mentally handicapped students currently in the ESD program. The students are all from the county, but are enrolled in ESD special education programs.

The board also received information on the ESD's

resolution programs for next year. About 90 percent of the ESD programs will be on resolution next year, according to Burns. Resolution programs must be approved by a vote of the 28 school boards in the county.

Programs not approved are not offered the following year.

United Way sets high goal

Campaigners for the Columbia-Willamette chapter of United Way, which includes Clackamas County, will seek an unprecedented \$16 million in contributions this fall.

"It's up to us to help reduce the human cost of social service cutbacks," said Carl Halvorson, 1981 volunteer campaign chairman. "Unfortunate people in our community should not be made to bear the cost of slowing down inflation."

Reasons for increasing the goal include three new social service agencies, the addition of the American Cancer Society as a partner in fund

solicitation and the effects of government cutbacks.

The group raised \$12.2 million in 1980 to help fund 92 area social service agencies. There are 94 agencies this year.

The new agencies are A Child's Place (Un Lugar Para Ninos), a bi-lingual, bi-cultural child care center which will receive \$27,210 for its first year; the Mainstream Youth Program, a diagnostic and treatment service for alcoholics under 21, which will receive \$24,000; and the Metro Crisis Intervention Service, an emergency contact agency for personal

crises such as suicide, which will receive \$42,000.

Funding was discontinued for the Runyon-Winchell Cancer Fund, since United Way added four units of the American Cancer Society.

Rules may change for food stamp benefits

Clackamas County residents may soon find that food stamp benefits will undergo revision.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announce proposed rules that would change the way food stamp benefits are calculated in the initial month of application. The changes are designed to reduce program costs and better target program benefits to the actual needs of the applicant.

Rules now in effect allow people who qualify for benefits to receive a full month's allotment whether they apply on the second or 28th of the month. "This sometimes results in households receiving benefits retroactively and providing them food stamps for a period of time for which they have already purchased

food," said assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary Jarratt.

Under one option of the proposal, people who apply for food stamps after the 15th day of the month will receive only half a month's allotment. This proposal could save \$210 million annually in food stamp costs.

Under the second option, food stamp benefits paid in the first month of eligibility would be prorated on a daily basis. This should save some \$420 million annually.

Jarratt said the proposal is in line with the department's efforts to reduce program spending and make it more accountable. Approximately 23 million persons currently participate in the program each month and receive \$955 million in food stamps.

Development hearing set on Mulino Airport

A public hearing on the proposed developments of the Mulino Airport Master Plan has been scheduled for July 9 by the Port of Portland.

The facility is designed to serve all of Clackamas County.

The purpose of the hearing is to consider the economic, social and environmental effects of the recommended airport master plan, which

calls for acquisition and expansion of an existing, privately owned, public use airport in Mulino.

The hearing will be at Oregon City High School's auditorium, beginning at 7 p.m.

Copies of the plan are available at the Clackamas County Library and libraries in Canby, Molalla and Oregon City.
