# Baha's decry Iranian persecution

In the aftermath of the execution of seven of their fellow members in Iran on June 14, the Sandy Baha'i community has joined its National Spiritual Assembly in appealing to Kurt Waldheim, secretary-general of the United Nations, to send a representative to Iran.

That representative would investigate the condition of the persecuted Baha'i community and take steps to alleviate the plight of its members.

In its message to the secretary-general, the local Baha'i community said, "Recent executions of seven members of the Local Spiritual Assembly of Hamadan, Iran demand immediate actions to safeguard the rights of all Iranian Baha'is from continued persecution."

The United States Baha'i Assembly said the Supreme Judicial Council of Iran ap-

proved the executions on the basis of "trumped-up" charges, including corruption, fighting God and His Messenger and collaboration with world Zionism.

"These charges bear no relation whatsoever to reality," the Baha'i National Assembly asserted, "but serve as a refrain in the shrill rhetoric being used by the Shiite clergy in their fanatic opposition to the Baha'i Faith, which they regard as heresy."

The Baha'i National Assembly called the attention of Waldheim to the threat of summary executions faced by the scores of prominent Baha'is now being held in Iranian prisons. It said that thousands of appeals to Iranian authorities had been made by the Baha'is of more than 300 countries and dependencies, but nothing had resulted from the pleas.

Reports of the persecution

of the Baha'is of Iran over the past two years have consistently cited the confiscation of all Baha'i properties, the expropriation of the financial assets of the Baha'i-owned establishments, the destruction of private dwellings, the wholesale dismissal of Baha'is from their jobs, the desecration of Baha'i cemeteries and the demolition of the holiest Baha'i shrine in Iran, according to Bill Knight-Weiler of Sandy.

He said the executions of Baha'i leaders are a recent development in the assault on Iran's Baha'i community.

The Baha'i Faith originated in Iran in 1844 and has been opposed as a heresy ever since by the Moslem clergy.

Meanwhile, the religion has developed a worldwide following with adherents in more than 100,000 localities around the world, according

to Knight-Weiler. The religion's founder, Baha'u'llah, was exiled from his native Iran because of his teachings, including the unity of the world's religions, the oneness of all races, the equality of men and women

and the necessity of establishing a world government to ensure universal peace.

Proposed merger will be considered at a special meeting of the share holders of the Independent Bank of Sandy to be held at 11:00 a.m. on July 23, 1981 at the offices of the bank at 38561 Proctor Blvd., Sandy, Oregon. Under the proposed reorganization, the Independent Bank of Sandy and Willamette Falls State Bank would merge into a new bank to be known as the Independent Bank of Oregon. Excerpts from Oregon Revised Statutes 711.045 RIGHTS OF STOCK HOLDERS WHO DISSENT TO MERGER:

(1) A dissenting stock holder of a bank shall receive the value in cash of those shares which were voted against a merger upon written demand made to the resulting bank at any time within 30 days after the effective date of the merger, accompanied by the surrender of the stock certificates.

(2) The value of the shares of the dissenting stock holders making written demand under subsection (1) of this section shall be ascertained, as of the effective date of the merger, by three appraisers. One appraiser shall be selected by the vote of the owners of 2/3 of the shares involved at a meeting called by the superintendent

on 10 days notice, one selected by the Board of Directors of the resulting bank and the third selected by the two so chosen. The valuation agreed upon by any two appraisers shall govern, and all the dissenting stock holders involved shall be bound by the amount so fixed. If any necessary appraiser is not appointed within 60 days after the effective date of the merger or if the appraisal is not completed within 90 days after the merger becomes effective, the superintendent shall cause an appraisal to be made. The expenses of appraisal shall be paid by the resulting bank.

(3) The amount due under the appraisal shall constitute a debt of the resulting bank. The shares of stock of the resulting bank that would have been delivered to a dissenting stock holder had he not requested payment shall be sold by the resulting bank at an advertised public auction. The resulting bank may purchase the stock if it is the highest bidder and shall resell the shares within six months after the auction, unless the period is extended by the superintendent at a price, not less than par determined by its Board of Directors. If the shares are sold at public auction at a price greater than the amount paid to the dissenting stock holders, the difference shall be paid to the dissenting stock holders.

# PUBLIC NOTICE OF FILING OF GENERAL TELEPHONE RATE INCREASE APPLICATION

On June 26, 1981, General Telephone Co. of the Northwest filed with the Public Utility Commissioner of Oregon revised rate schedules to establish increased telephone service rates to its Oregon customers.

If approved as submitted, the \$24.7 million requested adjustment in state revenue represents an increase of about 23 percent, or an average approximating 4 percent per year since the last overall rate change.

Basic one-party residential rates for General Telephone's customers would increase in the range of \$ .97 cents to \$5.50 per month, depending on the size of the exchange involved, the local calling availability and the type of service being provided.

**Why Are We Proposing An Increase In Telephone Rates?**

General Telephone was last authorized to increase its rates in August, 1975. During the past six years, rapid growth in our serving area, a large construction program and increased operating costs have created a need to raise capital at a time of high interest rates and double-digit inflation. The revenue growth rate is not sufficient under the present tariff to cover the increased costs in providing the present and future service, to keep the company financially sound and to improve its recently lowered bond ratings.

# Obituaries

**Everett Darr**

Services for longtime Government Camp resident Everett Darr, 74, were held June 24 at the Bateman Funeral Chapel in Gresham.

Mr. Darr was born March 3, 1907, in Memphis, Tenn., and died June 22 at Gresham Community Hospital. He came to Portland in 1917 where he was employed for several years with Oregon Portland Cement Co.

In 1937 he started a Mountain Shop on Broadway Street in Portland, where he was owner-operator until moving to Government Camp in 1947. There he opened another Mountain Shop and was owner-operator of the Summit Ski area. In 1950 he became part owner and manager of Multitorpor Ski Bowl.

He was a member of the Mazamas, WyEast Climbers, American Alpine, National Ski Patrol and the Oregon Agate and Mineral Society. He was a lifetime member of the Cascade Ski Club.

Mr. Darr married Ada Zacher on July 3, 1937, in Stevenson, Wash.

He is survived by his wife; three children, Joseph of Portland, Peter and Mallory Linda Darr, both of Government Camp; two sisters, Nina Littleton of The Dalles and Vella Camden of Tillamook, and one granddaughter.

Private vault interment was in Rose City Cemetery in Portland.
