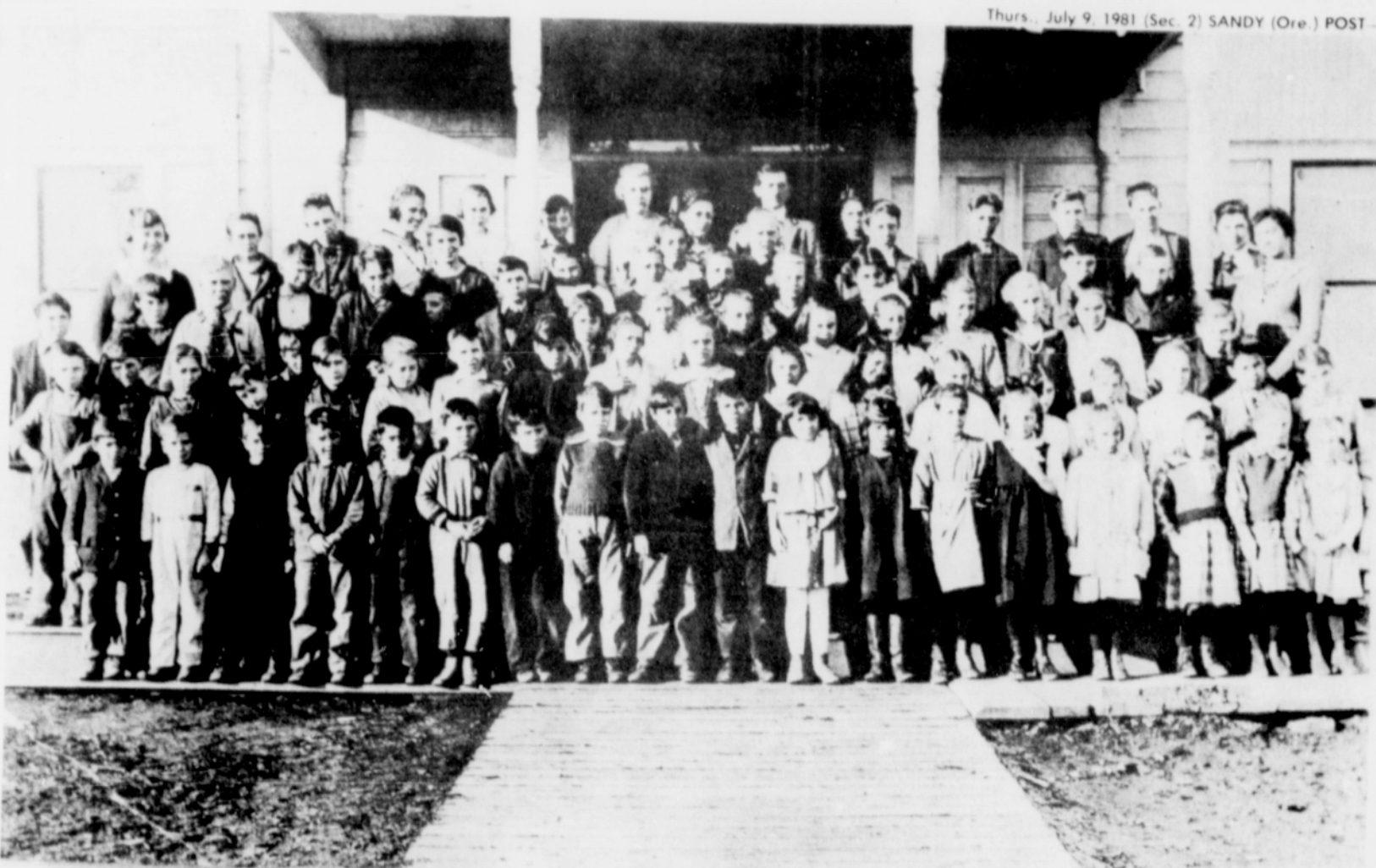

Welches traffic light "won't present hazard"

The proposed traffic light at the intersection of Welches Road and U.S. Highway 26 won't present a traffic hazard, according to region traffic engineer Ron Failmeizer of the State Highway Division.

Failmeizer said that traffic volumes at the controversial intersection have increased and warrant installation of a traffic signal.

But many area residents have expressed concern that the signal may cause traffic backups on U.S. 26. Failmeizer said the system is designed to prevent that.

"The traffic signal will remain green on U.S. 26 unless there is a vehicle on the side street or left-turn lane, or if a pedestrian pushes the walk button," he said.

"Pedestrians and vehicles will not immediately trigger a red signal to U.S. 26 traffic. This signal controller will be flexible enough that there will be no problem in making sure traffic on the highway is not unreasonably interrupted."

"Signal Ahead" signs with flashing warning lights will be installed on the highway in advance of the intersection.

Failmeizer said that he will be observing the traffic numerous times during the day, including weekends, after the signal is activated to make sure the timing and warning signs are adequate.

The signal is expected to be operating some time in November this year. The State awarded a contract this April.

Commissioners aiming for improved relations

The Clackamas County Commissioners believe the county needs to improve its public relations.

The commissioners last week endorsed a proposal to create a nine-member human relations commission to "promote... mutual understanding... among all economic, religious, ethnic and social groups in the county."

They will consider an ordinance to establish the commission at the next meeting, this Thursday, July 9, at 10 a.m. The meeting will be in the County Courthouse Annex at 906 Main St. in Oregon City.

Commissioner Ralph Groener asked the North Clackamas Human Relations Council to look into forming such a commission.

According to the council's resulting proposal, the commission would be comprised of nine members "representing all minorities and geographic areas of the county."

It would have staggered, three-year terms of office. The beginning budget of the commission would be \$10,000.

New company seeks out addresses for a fee

BORING — Daryl Nichols Jr. is a private detective... of sorts.

For a small fee, he'll seek out the address of that movie star you have the hots for or that politician you'd like to tell a thing or two.

Lonnie Anderson of CBS's WKRP or Sesame Street mastermind Jim Henderson, sci-fi novelist Ray Bradbury or Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini — you can send them fan mail or hate mail as you choose. And if Nichols can't find the address, he'll send your money back.

The idea for Addresses Unlimited "came in stages," says Nichols, 21. He is assistant manager for a McDonald's restaurant in Portland and is the city's representative for Golden Fantasies, a Eugene-based distributor of the game Dungeons and Dragons.

"I received a solicitation from Greenpeace (an organization supporting preservation of certain wildlife) one day, and it had the address for the minister of fisheries in the Soviet Union," he says. The idea was that members should write to the minister to oppose the country's whaling industry, which the organization opposes.

"I thought, wow! Somebody must have done some research to come up with that," he says. "That was pretty neat."

That gave him the idea of finding the address of his favorite author, he says.

Then, unhappy with his 1980 Ford Mustang's frequent visits to the shop, he made a few calls to discover the address of Ford Motor Company's president.

Finally, a friend suggested he market the idea, which Nichols says he probably should have thought of sooner.

"When I've got the money, I'd like to advertise in the National Enquirer or Midnight Star," he says. "That's about \$6 per word, but with a circulation of millions I'm bound to get some inquiries."

He's already working on a list of 500 addresses he'll sell for \$5, which will include actors, top-selling authors, world figures, controversial or popular groups and, of course, the Soviet Union's whaling minister.

"Alan Alda will be high on the list. He's pretty popular right now," Nichols says. "And I'm thinking about having addresses for Prince Charles and Lady Diana... and groups like Moral Majority."

Also on the list will be Bill Cosby, his wife's choice. He and Rachelle, 21, live at 32700 SE Leewood Lane.

Normally, Nichols charges \$1 apiece for addresses he's asked to find. He will send information about the process to those who write to Addresses Unlimited, P.O. Box 513, Boring, 97009.
