Timberline Rim sets craft market, tour

The second annual Timberline Rim Craft Market will be held this Saturday and Sunday, July 18-19, at the Rim's lodge in Brightwood.

The sale will run from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days.

In addition, a Tour of Homes has been scheduled for Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m. The tour will include the viewing of 10 homes in the Timberline Rim community. There will be a \$3.50 admission fee for the tour; tickets are on sale at the lodge. A babysitting service will be available at an additional charge.

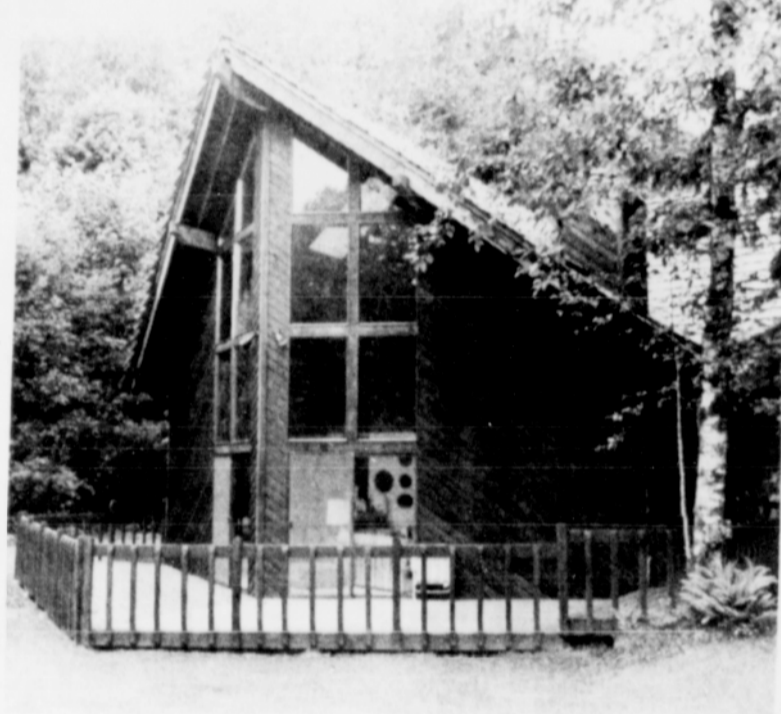
More than 30 artists, mostly local, will display their wares during the sale. A wide variety of crafts will be shown, including clay and bronze sculptures, wood carving, stained glass, weaving,

lace work, oil painting, water colors and blown egg painting.

Other displays will offer pottery, home-sewn clothes and toys for children, knitting and crochet work, sterling jewelry, floral candles, dried arrangements, tile painting, ceramic ware, photography, enamel ware and many other miscellaneous projects.

There will also be ongoing demonstrations by various artists, a display by the mountain artisans guild and a co-op display of spinning and weaving techniques by the Damascus Pioneer Craft School.

"The entire affair is a miniature version of Portland's Saturday Market, but with the flavor and flair of the mountain," said co-chairman Ann Green.

County recognized for achievements

Clackamas County was recognized by three 1981 national achievement awards at the National Association of Counties (NACo) Conference in Louisville, Ky., July 11-15.

The self-issuing transportation permits of the Department of Environmental Services, the Civil Service Department's clerical skills training program and the Human Resources Department's training program for the visually impaired were honored.

The awards give national recognition to progressive county developments which demonstrate an improve-

ment in service to citizens. Case studies of each will be distributed to other counties to serve as examples of innovative programs.

Self-issuing transportation permits allow the truckers to telephone Clackamas County for permission to drive over-weight or over-length vehicles on county roads rather than driving to Oregon City prior to each trip. The new self-issuing permits make huge savings over the old system, according to county traffic engineer Bernie Straight.

In 1979, prior to the program, the county issued 4,000 permits which required

2,500 man-hours.

"Now we save time for taxpayers, fuel for truckers and costs for consumers," Straight said.

People with limited vision have rewarding jobs manufacturing electronic parts on color-coded, tactical assembly boards, thanks to the award-winning program to train the visually impaired. The county's Comprehensive Training and Employment Office (CETA) equips people to work for industry for the Visually Im-

paired, an electronics manufacturer in Milwaukie. "Although people are legally blind, they are productively employed," said CETA's Roy Soards.

The clerical skills training Program, operated by the county's Civil Service and Personnel Department, received a NACo award for meeting three needs: training for unemployed County residents, skilled office personnel for county jobs, and a county clerical pool to serve all departments.



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
