

Highway taxes enrich city

City of Sandy coffers are \$19,550.47 richer as the result of the State Highway Division dispersal of highway user tax funds to Oregon's incorporated cities.

The Highway Division has distributed more than \$9.8 million since the first of the year to cities for use in local road and street programs.

The allocation is based on the statutory 12.17 percent, and has already been distributed on a monthly

basis. It went to 241 incorporated cities in the state, whose combined population now totals 1,482,668.

The funds come from motor vehicle registration and operator's license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties for violations of the size and weight statutes from citations issued by Highway Division weighmasters.

The apportionment is based

on the population of each city as determined by the Center for Population Research and Census at Portland State University. Sandy's allowance was based on a population of 2,940.

The population figures are as of May 30, 1981.

The apportionment this year is down from one year ago. For the same period in 1980, the apportionment was \$10,314,817.

Robert M. Bramson has studied how people behave and learn at work, and he has searched for ways of understanding how they came to be "that way."

As a management consultant, he discovered that they could be typed and coped with effectively. He received his doctorate in organization behavior and psychology of small groups from the University of California at Berkeley. His conclusions, based on the past 10 years in a national management consulting firm, has culminated in this extremely helpful book, "Coping With Difficult People."

The behavior patterns are characterized by seven main types:

Hostile-Aggressives: People who bully and over-

whelm others, making cutting remarks (snipers) or throwing tantrums.

Complainers: They gripe incessantly, but feel powerless and refuse to take responsibility in improving the problems.

Unresponsives: You might as well talk to dead air.

Super-Agreeables: They support your ideas with enthusiasm but don't produce what they say they will.

Negativists: They deflate

any optimism you might have.

Know-It-All Experts: They want you to know that they know everything about anything worth knowing. They're condescending and

pompous.

Indecisives: They can't make a decision.

Five styles of thinking are also discussed, including the Synthesist, Idealist, Pragmatist, Analyst and

Realist.
