Book review:

Look at marriage cures summer grouch

The library sent me a stack of books to read while I'm laid up with a summer flu virus. I turn surly when I'm sick, but Louise DeGrave's book, "From This Day Forward," tickled me out of my grouch. It is about the psychological infighting in a marriage that was made a little lower than heaven.

I wanted to give you an abbreviated sample of her humor, so I tried to choose between her views on pornographic movies, health

foods or having her wisdom teeth extracted. I couldn't decide, so I'll give you her distinctions on the past and the current moral quagmires.

"Up until 20 years ago, things were very clear. Nudity was a state of undress, moral when employed in the procreation of children, or in great works of art before 1750. Perversity was two or more nude bodies of the same sex not in a locker room, or three nude bodies, mixed sexes, anywhere. Now nothing is clear.
