

Agency on aging members sought

The Clackamas County Area Agency on Aging Advisory Council is seeking new members.

The council advises the County Board of Commissioners on matters which affect county residents 60 years of age or older. Among the responsibilities are advising on how federal, state and county funds are spent, advising on county policy and commenting on policies and procedures of other organizations which serve Clackamas County residents.

Persons interested in the position should submit and application form and an introductory letter. The letter should detail reasons why

the individual would like to serve on the council and describe the individual's background.

The council includes some 29 members, including Ruth Baumbach of Sandy. All appointments are for a three-year term.

Mid-September too late for MHCC registration

Students who wait until the middle of September to register for fall classes at Mt. Hood Community College may be too late, according to president Dr. R. Stephen Nicholson.

A combination of factors may mean that the college won't be able to handle all the students who want to take fall classes, Nicholson said.

"Those who register during August will get the classes they want, but those who wait until September might find that the classes they want are already closed," he said.

Approximately eight percent fewer class sections have been scheduled this fall

because of reduced state funding for community colleges.

"This also means that money is not available to add more sections for classes that fill up early," Nicholson said. "We still have an open door, but it is now open on a first come, first served basis."

MHCC had 1,810 class sections last fall; a total of 1,673 are scheduled for this year, which amounts to a 7.6 percent decrease.

Nicholson said that more students than usual may be looking at community colleges this fall because of tighter entrance requirements at state universities.

For writing class

MHCC sets screening test

Mt. Hood Community College will begin screening students this fall who register for writing classes offered by the literature and composition division.

New students will take the College Guidance and Placement Test to determine if they will be enrolled in Basic Writing, WR 10 or Writing-Hold, WR 125.

All other students wishing to register for Thesis Essay Writing, WR 120, or English Composition, WR 121, will also be enrolled in Writing-Hold, WR 125, for the day and time they desire.

During the first class meeting of Writing-Hold, all students will take a writing placement test. Based on the results of this

test, the students will be placed in the appropriate course. Thesis Essay Writing or English Composition.

"The college is making every effort to try to guarantee student success with this screening process," said Alan Goodell, MHCC associate dean of instruction. "This approach is a result of recommendations made by our student success and retention committee. We want to help the students avoid a writing class that is too advanced for them to complete successfully."

Any students with questions regarding their final placement in a writing class will be able to talk to the chairman of the

literature and composition division.

Goodell pointed out that students should register as early as possible this summer to that they can take the initial placement test and schedule a course at a convenient time and day. He also emphasized that students in the Writing-Hold course should not miss the first classes when instruction begins this fall.

Fall term classes begin Monday, Sept. 28, at MHCC and registration is now open on the Gresham campus in the admissions office.
