County plan review delayed

The long-awaited review of Clackamas County's comprehensive land-use plan by Oregon's Land Conservation and Development Commission has been delayed until Oct. 29-30.

LCDC staff notified the county that the originally-

scheduled August review has been postponed because of the commission's workload.

The county's plan and related ordinances were submitted to LCDC in June 1980. In December, the commission reviewed the plan and sent it back to the county, giving it 120 days to make revisions.

An anticipated June

acknowledgement review was postponed when LCDC adopted a new administrative rule on what is required to meet its Goal 5 concerning natural resources and open spaces. Then the August review was delayed.

Also during the past year, the zoning of some 17,500 acres in the county was

challenged by the Metropolitan Service District and 1,000 Friends of Oregon, a land-use watchdog group.

County commissioners held two marathon public hearings in May to gather more information about the challenged zoning, which they then forwarded to LCDC.

Cemetery expansion sought

The Clackamas County hearings officer considers a plan today that would expand Sandy Ridge Cemetery.

The hearing will occur at 1 p.m. at the Department of Environmental Services, 902 Abernethy Road, Oregon City.

Clackamas County officials are seeking an alteration on a non-conforming use to make a lot line adjustment with property to the south to

increase the size of the cemetery by four acres. The cemetery is on the southside of Highway 211, approximately one mile west of 362nd Drive, in an area designated a General Agricultural District.

This Monday, Aug. 17, the hearings officer will consider an appeal by a Sandy man that would allow construction of a second residence on land in the Firwood area. The hearing, at

the Department of Environmental Services, is scheduled to begin at 9:45 a.m.

Ralph Hames is appealing the county Planning Division staff's decision to deny his Farm-Forest Management Plan request for a second residence, in conjunction with a farm use.

The property is on the northeast corner of the intersection of S.E. 442nd and Kiessacker Road.

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
