For Boring area residents

County pledges more winter patrols

Clackamas County sheriff's deputies will make more patrols in the Boring area this winter.

Traffic team member Deputy Ron Clinton told the Boring Neighborhood Advisory Group Monday that the department is trying to cover the entire county with five officers on the swing shift.

"That's 22,000 square miles of county," he said. "A

lot of times we can't get to some calls for several hours. We have to get to them on a priority basis."

Clair Reynolds, advisory committee chairman, invited the officer to speak in front of the group to explain where and how the sheriff's deputies can help with Boring's traffic problems. Reynolds said those areas include the intersections of 282nd Street and Highway

212; 272nd Street and Highway 212; Richey Road and Highway 212, and Highway 212 as it runs through the commercial area of the community.

"I don't know what the answer could be," said Clinton. He said the department plans to have a car in the area full-time after some 25 newly-hired deputies are trained. He said there may be an additional car in the

area on a half-time basis. Clinton said the deputies would be ready to go to work by February or March.

In the meantime he suggested asking for a road and speed survey, which the committee did over the summer. The county has completed its survey, and the state Highway Department is expected to conduct a similar study in October, according to Helen Liere, liaison between the committee and the county.

Some citizens at the meeting asked what they could do to control the traffic. Clinton said residents can register legal complaints that could stand up in court if they could get the driver's name, the car license, a description of the vehicle and any other information concerning the incident. He said if the street is congested and a person is driving too fast, the person can be charged with careless driving.
