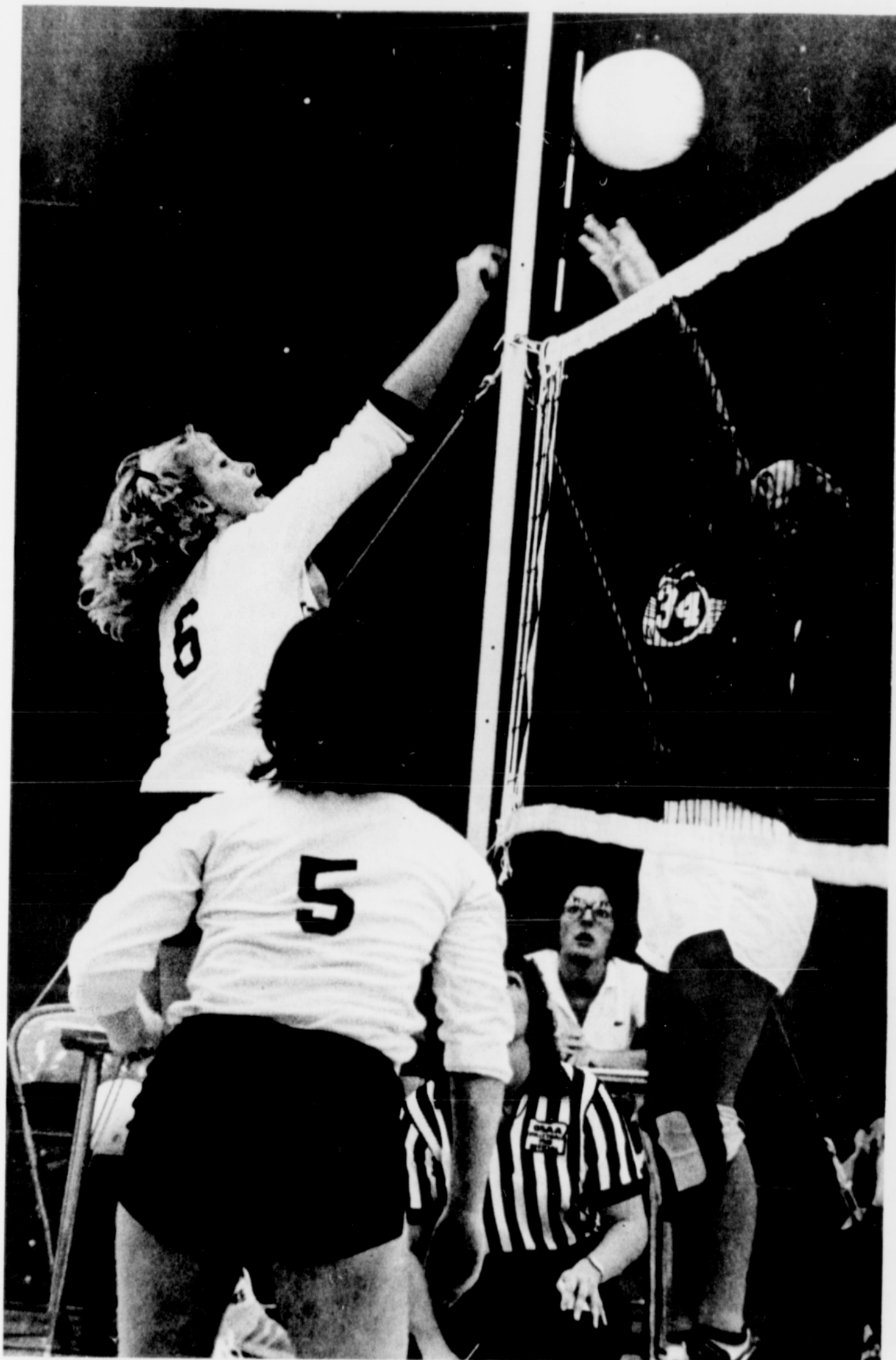

MONDAY

ADULT MORNING EXERCISES will be held Mondays from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. and on Thursdays from 9-10 a.m., beginning Oct. 5.

Bill Knight-Weiler will be leading the class, with the goal being to learn exercises that will benefit the entire body.

Adult morning exercise will last 10 weeks, and will be held at the Sandy Community-Senior Center. The fee is \$1 for residents, \$2 for non-residents, and free to senior citizens.

DUNGEONS AND DRAGONS, the ultimate fantasy board game, features orcs, bugbears, screechers and stone giants. Bryan Zimmerman and other

The program, which lasts 10 weeks, begins Oct. 5 and runs from 7-9 p.m. It will be held at the Sandy Community Center with a \$1 fee for residents, \$2 for non-residents.

TUESDAY

YOUTH BASKETBALL (11-14) is an opportunity for the youngsters in the community to compete in this popular sport despite the school budget cuts that eliminated after-school athletics.

A very important meeting for parents will take place Sept. 28 at 7 p.m. at the Sandy Community Center.

AEROBIC DANCING (for women) is Sandy's most popular exercise class ever. It's taught by "a great professional," Becky Hawley.

The class begins Sept. 22 and runs from 7:15 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. A \$15 fee will be charged for the eight-week program, which will be held at the Cedar Ridge gym, except for the first class meeting, which will be held at the Sandy Elementary School gym.

Elk, deer hunting prospects are good

Hunters can look forward this fall to deer and elk hunting prospects little changed in most areas from last year, improvement in populations of major upland bird species, a duck migration only slightly down from last year and a good year for most species of geese.

Deer and elk populations are stable in western Oregon and in eastern Oregon a mild winter allowed improved fawn survival in many areas meaning better numbers of yearling bucks as well as a good carryover of older age-class bucks. Elk numbers are up through most of northeast Oregon.

Mule deer hunters will have a 12-day season again, running from October 3 through 14 in most units. In seven units where buck ratios are below desired levels a one week season will prevail, ending October 9. Antler regulations

were eased this year and bucks with visible antlers will be legal in most areas.

The Steens Unit will remain under a 4-point restriction with entry limited to 1,300 permit holders. In the Trout Creek Mountains hunting is limited to 200 permit holders, but they are free to select any buck with visible antlers. Permits were offered on a first come, first served basis and all are taken.

Black-tailed deer populations have been quite stable for the last three years and hunters can expect buck numbers about the same as last year. A month-long season was again set running from October 3 through November 3 for bucks with forked antler or better. Five days of either-sex hunting is scheduled for hunters with an unused black-tail tag in all or parts of 10 units in northwest Oregon, and controlled hunt permits are authorized in southwestern Oregon units. Permits

were issued through a controlled hunt drawing and no more are available.

A high Cascades buck hunt, a two-month either sex deer hunt in the Willamette Unit and a three weekend hunt in the McDonald Forest near Corvallis are also scheduled.

Western Oregon elk hunters will again have a split general bull season with the hunter to select the first period or the second at the time he buys his tag. Season dates this year are November 14 through 17 and November 21 and 27.

Nonie Smith, tournament director, said that golf carts will be available. A rental fee of \$7 and \$12 will be charged for the nine-hole and the 18-hole divisions, respectively.
