

Neighborhood group elects officers

In 1969 103 condominiums, to be built on stilts, were planned for construction on a lush meadow in the town of Rhododendron. This sparked a group of locals to join together to stop the development.

At that time this group was called the Rhododendron Improvement Committee, and was the first organized citizen planning organization in Clackamas County.

In the fight to save the meadow, the Committee had to convince the Clackamas County Planning Division, as well as the county commissioners, that the development was unsuitable because the meadow, though green with grass, was actually wetlands.

The battle ended when a resident rode a horse into the area eyed for development, and it sunk up to its belly. That was in mid-August during a dry year.

Today, 12 years later, the committee, now known as the Rhododendron Neighborhood Association, is still together and as concerned for the area as ever.

At the organization's annual meeting in September, officers were elected for another year. They are Wendell Tobey, chairperson; Raymond "Ike" Parion, vice chairperson; and Beth Laker, secretary-treasurer.

Colonel J.B. Baker, Edgil Panion, Mayrose Godsey, Mabel Griffin, and Edna and Dale Lamoreaux were all elected to the executive committee.

In the coming year the association will be closely monitoring two projects in the area.

Boring residents brave rain to clean area

BORING — Citizens braved the rain on Saturday here to gather rubbish from yards and fields as part of a Boring Neighborhood Advisory Committee clean up day.

Volunteers from the Boring Strategy Area came to the Boring Fire Hall to help

load garbage into four large refuse bins. Committee members had earlier distributed flyers through the community to advertise the event.

The committee has sponsored three clean up days to help rid the neighborhood of

dumped garbage and yard trash that piles up, said Helen Liere, liaison between the committee and Clackamas County.

People were asked to haul the garbage to the Fire Hall, then the committee pays the county to haul it to the dump. Liere said a lot of tires were collected. "We have gotten old appliances and stuff like that," she said.

The committee tried to encourage recycling by mentioning recycling centers on the flyer and by reminding the people at the Fire Hall.

The advisory committee uses federal funds to do community improvements in the area including the community clean up days. The committee is discussing a program that would help area resident purchase paint to

brighten up the exteriors of homes in the area.

Citizens in the area are invited to the next meeting of the committee at 7 p.m. on Oct. 27 at the Fire Hall.

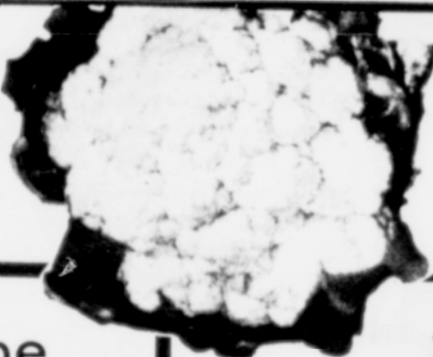

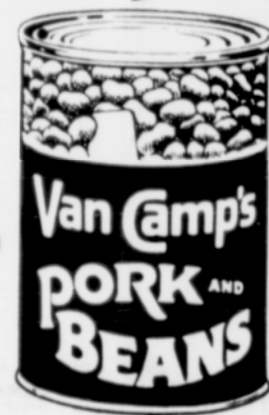
