Alder Creek controversy continues

The battle for clean and plentiful drinking water along the Mt. Hood Corridor continues today, and, as it has in past years, the majority of the skirmishes being fought centering on the controversial Alder Creek Water Company.

The company was placed in receivership last September by U.S. District Judge Gus Solomon to eliminate what the State Health Division called a potential health hazard.

The water company is made up of three non-contiguous systems that stretch over a 12-mile area. Within that area five systems, each with its own water source, serve some 200 customers.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the State Health Division are seeking to have the company's water systems declared a health hazard, and assist in the formation of a new service district to alleviate the hazardous condition.

The company's receiver, Gene Ginter of the Beaverton-based engineering firm, Ginter and Associates, has computed that such a district would cost around \$1.7 million. He said that if seven percent loan money is secured through the Farmer's Home Administration, that it would cost water customers anywhere from \$14 to \$27 per month, in addition to the current \$20 a month user's fee.

However, the company's customers claim that no such district is needed because the system's water is not hazardous to one's health. They have charged that Ginter has deliberately ignored the repairs that need to be made to the system in order to create a potential health problem, which is needed to form such a district.

The customers of the company are currently battling Ginter, the EPA, and the Health Division, in a health hazard hearing, where the new service district could be formed without a vote of the people. The customers maintain that such a district would cost them a \$100 or more a month when it isn't

even needed.

Customers in the Sleepy Hollow, Wildwood, Riverside, Barlow and Country Club districts have banded together to form the "Alder Creek Users Association," and have retained an attorney to combat the new district's formation.

Jock Stewart, chairperson of the association, emphasized in a recent interview that the new district is going to affect everyone in the area, whether they are hooked up to the Alder Creek system or not. He said that those having private wells will also be assessed, whether they hooked up or not.

Stewart said that although each of the company's districts has united, he feels that the word real-

ly has not gotten out, and that there are still people who are unaware that they would be financially affected by the new district.

Nan Slenning, vice chairperson of the association, said that the organization feels that they could take over receivership of the water company, and provide the customers with good, clean water "a lot cheaper than the current receiver."

The guest speakers will be Violet Yager and Carolyn Taylor, nurse practitioners.

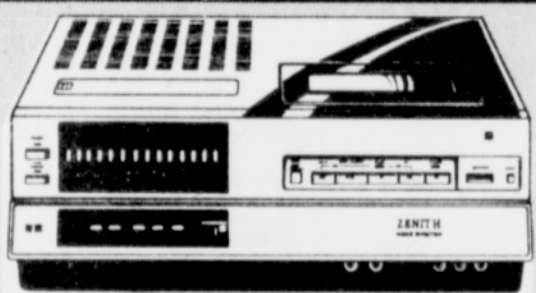
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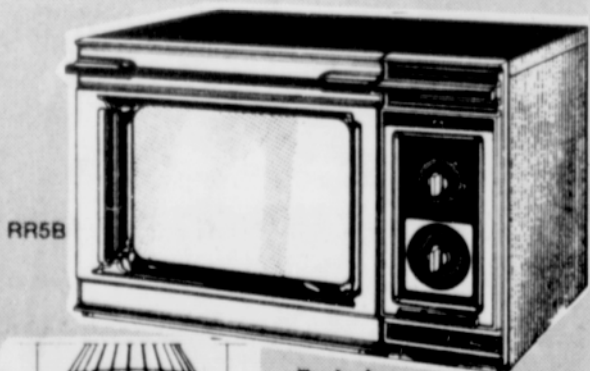


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
