

November

- Store potatoes at about 40° F. in a dark area with moderate humidity.
- Western Oregon: still time to plant garlic for harvest next summer.
- Western Oregon: bait garden and flower beds for slugs during rainy periods.
- Fruit tree sanitation: to prevent possible spread of leaf diseases, rake and destroy leaves from around base of trees.
- Place mulch around berries for winter protection.
- Tie red raspberry canes to wires; prune to 1 foot above the wire. Check for holes made by crown borers at base of plant.
- Western Oregon: good time to plant landscape trees and shrubs, fruit trees.
- Western Oregon: prune and transplant shrubs and trees.
- Prune roses to 2 to 2½ feet to prevent winter wind damage.
- Still time to plant spring-flowering bulbs, but don't delay.
- Renew mulch around perennial flower beds after removing weeds.
- Spray arborvitae for Berckmann's blight.
- Western Oregon: cut and root rhododendrons and camellias; root begonias from leaf cuttings.
- Moss appearing in lawn means too much shade, poor drainage, low fertility, soil compaction, or thin stand of grass.
- Watch for wet soil and drainage problems in yard during heavy rains. Tiling, ditching are possible solutions.
- Rake and compost leaves; a 3- to 4-inch layer of leaves spread over the garden plot prevents soil compaction by rain.
- Provide winter protection to built-in sprinkler systems; drain the system, insulate the valve mechanisms.
- Reduce fertilizer applications to houseplants.
- Prepare lawnmower, other garden equipment for winter storage. Store hoses carefully to avoid damage from freezing.

Stem cuttings best way to propagate new plants

Flower gardeners who can't bear to see cold fall weather decimate their geraniums will be glad to know there are alternatives to simply letting the plant die.

"Several methods of saving geraniums through the winter are available," said Ray McNeilan, Oregon State University extension home gardening agent. "Propagating hardy new plants from stem cuttings is the easiest and best way."

Take stem cuttings only from vigorous plants. Firm stems are harder than soft, succulent growth.

The cuttings should be two to four inches long. Strip off half the leaves, insert the cuttings firmly into a pot of sand and water thoroughly. Keep the cut-

tings lightly shaded for two to three weeks.

After root growth has started, give the cuttings full sunlight and move them into a pot containing loamy soil where the cuttings will be permanently planted.

Geraniums can also be nursed through the winter as house plants. Simply dig the plant up, place it in a pot and move it indoors.

When digging, save as many roots as possible. Then prune back the top of the plant about half way. Remove all dead, diseased and damaged plant parts to avoid rot. Destroy any insects on the plant by dusting or spraying.

The geranium should be planted in as small a pot as will hold the root ball. The geranium can be kept as a

houseplant or put in a cool greenhouse where it can be maintained in a semi-active state until spring.

A third method is to lift the geranium from the ground, shake the soil from the root system and hang the unpruned plant upside down in a cool, dark, damp storage area.

In the spring, repot or replant the geranium after pruning away withered or dead foliage and stems.

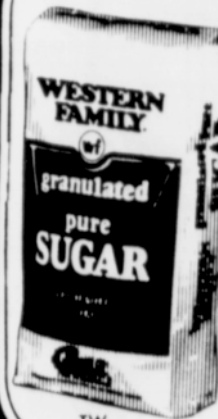

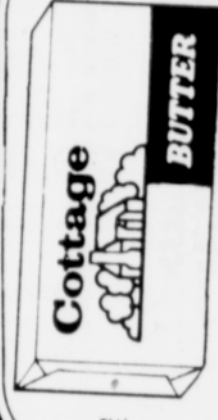
