CIAC, through monthly meetings, advises the county commissioners on how to make information about land use available to people in a timely, understandable way, according to Ardis Stevenson, assistant en-

vironmental services director.

In the past, the committee has sponsored county-wide citizens forums, suggested improvements through the format of public notices, and evaluated the county's official citizen involvement program, Stevenson said.

CIAC will meet at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 24 at the Department of Environmental Services offices in Oregon City. All meetings are open to the public.

The \$52,525 for 1980-81 reported in the audit is not illegal because the district did not exceed the amount budgeted, Rodger said.

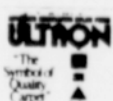
