Clark enters gubernatorial race in 1984

Don Clark, Multnomah county executive, announced Monday that he will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor of Oregon in 1982. Clark, 48, said, "After giving this race careful consideration, I have concluded that not only should I run for governor, but that I can win in May and I can win in November. I have decided to run because I believe that there has been a severe erosion in the last three years of Oregon's tradition as a forceful, progressive and independent-minded state."

Clark noted that Oregon's economy is now the third worst in the United States and said that the state's high unemployment, combined with a lack of leadership, "has caused our morale, our confidence and our state to suffer."

"The tradition of the previous 20 years of progressive, bipartisan leadership must be re-established," Clark said. "We are no longer writing new chapters in the Oregon story. We are back on our heels, waiting for the next blow to land."

A fifth-generation Oregonian and native of Silverton, Clark is the elected county executive of Multnomah County—having served in that capacity since 1979.
