the decision of the people who belong to the Alder Creek Water Users Association because it is us who have been fighting against the EPA and the Health Division," Stenning said. "It will be out decision to choose the best alternative."

Stewart said the association's water consultant, Jerry Schmidt of Oregon Water Consultants, is studying the positive and negative attributes of each of the alternatives and will take the information to the association's board. From there it will go to each of the systems' users for a vote.

Stewart said he will ask the Health Division to postpone the scheduled Nov. 30 hearing for 45 days to allow adequate time for system customers to study the alternatives.

"Our intent is to negotiate from a position of power, not weakness. We will not be pressured into selecting any of the options without an adequate examination of what is entailed in each."

Stewart speculated that the new alternatives were offered to the association after Health Division and EPA officials saw how many people are involved in the association and their level of organization.

Gene Ginther, receiver for the Alder Creek Water

Company, disagreed.

He said the options were known of two days after the company was placed in receivership in September 1980. It wasn't until recently, he said, that any of the water customers had seriously taken a look at those alternatives.

Ginther indicated that he is open to an alternative to the county service district, if the health problems are eliminated. He said that any other plan would have to be able to finance the rebuilding of the system,

which would be done through assessments and a loan from the Farm Home Administration under his plan.

Ginther said the previous reports of the monthly cost of the county service district have been inaccurate.

He said the monthly charge would be based on a monthly metered users charge, the front footage and square footage of the property and the number of hookups on the lot, and the percentage of the loan.

Hood biker missing

Clackamas County Sheriff's deputies began a ground search Tuesday for a Portland man reported lost while hiking about 10 miles south of Government Camp.

Authorities are searching for Paul H. Clinton, 27, who left Saturday morning to hike in the Mt. Hood National Forest, said Lt. Lonnie Ryan, sheriff's information officer. He was reported missing Sunday evening by his mother, Helen, after failing to return home.

Clinton had planned a hike with several friends, but they cancelled out leaving the Portlander on his own, Ryan said.

Sheriff's deputies used a four-wheel drive vehicle to locate Clinton's vehicle, a 1967 bronze Camaro. It was found Monday on Lolo Pass Road near Zigzag.

Deputies had conducted a preliminary search with two-wheel drive vehicles, but snow in the area forced them to bring in all-terrain rigs to continue.
