Income statement is seminar topic

The income statement and the balance sheet will be the topics at a small business management seminar sponsored by Mt. Hood Community College and the Gresham Area Chamber of Commerce Dec. 9, at 7 a.m. in the Town and Gown room on the college's Gresham campus.

Because small businesses usually operate on limited capital reserves, it is important for the owners and managers to know the "profit picture" of their businesses at all times.

This seminar will discuss how to construct an income statement and a balance

sheet, how to use these documents as a barometer for the small business, and how using them can save the small business money.

The seminar leader is Tom Cowan. He is currently the manager of the credit training department for the First Interstate Bank. Cowan received a degree in business from Oregon State University and is now responsible for internal financial training for the First Interstate Bank system.

Center receives favorable review

The Child Evaluation Center, a testing service provided by Clackamas Education Service District (ESD) for the school districts of Clackamas County, was the subject of a special report to the ESD Board during its November meeting.

The report was prepared by a review committee made up of educators from school districts in the county that use the service, according to ESD Superintendent Bob Burns. The Center got good reviews, and a few recommendations for improvements.

According to Burns, the Center tests students for a variety of learning disabilities, perceptual disorders, and psychological problems that interfere with a child's ability to learn.

When educators from school districts served by the ESD suspect a student has difficulties in one of these areas, the student can be sent to the ESD for testing. The Center then sends the test results back to the school district along with recommendations for dealing with any learning problems the tests uncover.

Chuck Clemans, superintendent of Oregon City Public Schools and chairman of the committee, presented the report to the ESD Board.

According to the Clemans, the committee's recommendations are "not far reaching or revolutionary." He added that the committee saw the Center as "an appropriate role for the ESD" to assume, but had some specific suggestions for improvement.

Turn-around time on reports during the months of September and January was a concern for the committee, Clemans said, adding that this problem could be solved by adding some contracted services during peak loads.

The committee also felt there should be more emphasis on providing specific tests for students who can't need the full range of tests offered by the Center.

The amount of detail in the reports and recommendations following tests also came under committee scrutiny, according to Clemans. However, he added that there "is no way to respond to everyone's wishes, since some districts want only the test results with no prescriptions, while other districts want both."

The committee recommended that the center be continued at its current funding level, but felt there should be a shift in emphasis. According to Clemans, the Center, now in its sixth year as an ESD service, has provided consultative services as well as tests.

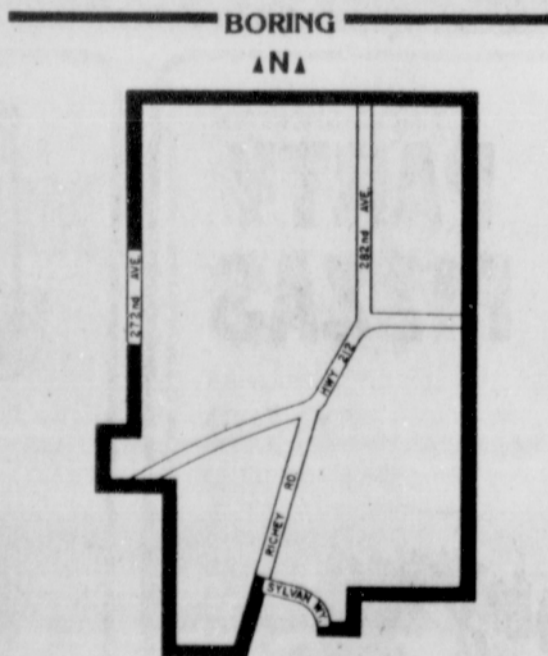
