

# Welches School

Armintrout, who inspected the building Monday with County Building Inspector Gary Yeman, said the school will have until Dec. 14 to correct the 12 minor deficiencies they found. If they are not corrected, there is a possibility that the school district will be requested to vacate the B and C wings until the corrections are made.

Armintrout emphasized the importance of the inspection to insure that life, safety and structural requirements are met. He said that in an inspection of A wing over Memorial Day weekend, an alarm system was found to be functioning improperly.

He said the alarm com-

pany that installed the device forgot to install an automatic dialer that connected the school's alarm directly to the fire department. As a result, a teacher's aide had to monitor the alarm panel for three weeks until the problem was corrected.

State Deputy Fire Marshal John Feiger said the confusion over who was to actually request the inspection is the issue in this case. He said that the architect should have made the request.

"Instead, he told school officials that the job was done and to hop into it," Feiger said.

"The architect should have notified the fire chief

and the county for a final inspection," he continued. "not just tell the school board to go ahead and occupy it. Whether or not the school board should have known better is another issue."

Leon Hamblin of Gessford and Associates said the firm issued a certificate of substantial completion and that is when the contractor, Glynbrook Construction of Salm, should have requested the final inspection.

He said his firm "wanted to make sure all the agencies involved were notified." A letter was written Nov. 24, which, he said, is normal follow-up procedure.

"We had written a letter to all the people involved, and stated that we hoped that the contractor had ordered the formal inspection," Hamblin said.

He said the inspection confusion was "just a technicality" and said the building just has some minor items on a "punch list" to be completed. He said there is no real danger involved because the fire department is located "just across the parking lot from the school."

Hamblin responded that it was "very difficult to second guess what goes on up there on the mountain. But it's a delightful little school anyways."

# None injured in two traffic wrecks

Sandy police responded to two traffic accidents during the week on the west end of the city.

Last Tuesday, Nov. 24, a non-injury accident occurred at 4:38 p.m. near the intersection of Highway 26 and Ruben Lane, in front of Janz Berryland.

Esther Margaret Perren of Sandy told police that

she was leaving the produce market's parking lot, making a left turn onto Highway 26. As she was pulling out onto Highway 26, her vehicle collided with a vehicle driven by Patrick Eugene Moore of Vancouver, Wash. No citations were issued.

Friday afternoon, at 3:46 p.m., Vincent George Mur-

dock of Troutdale escaped injury when the vehicle he was driving westbound on Highway 26 went off the road near University Avenue and stopped against the Sandy Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Murdock told police that he was traveling at about 30 mph when he got a flat tire on his right front

wheel, causing him to lose control of the car. He traveled about 200 feet off the highway before coming to a stop against the church. He was not injured and no citations were issued.

Sunday, police arrested Jason Patrick Steele, 19, of Sandy, on a warrant from Clackamas County officials for driving with a suspended license.

At the time of his arrest, Steele was also cited again for driving with a suspended license, inadequate mirrors on his vehicle and failure to show proof of automobile insurance.

He was lodged in Clackamas County Jail.

# Higher tax greets cigarette smokers

Smokers are paying more for their cigarettes this week. The state cigarette tax jumped 7 cents Monday.

The 1981 Oregon Legislature passed the tax hike—the first increase since 1972—as part of a program to balance the state's budget.

of Revenue, which collects the tax, will sell tax stamps to cigarette distributors at the higher rate. A stamp must be applied to each pack.

Distributors and retailers now owe additional tax on stock purchased at the old tax rate but are being sold after the increase went into effect. They were required to inventory stock on hand Nov. 30 and file special tax returns, with additional payments, by Dec. 20. The one-time "floor stock" tax

return forms have been sent to distributors and retailers.

Revenue department agents will check for compliance with the new law as they visit retailers around the state.


