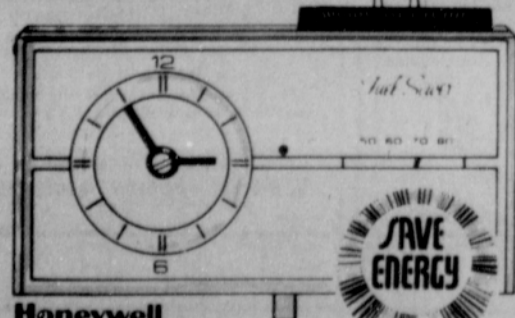

Government Camp directory out

Delivery of Pacific Northwest Bell's 1981 directory is scheduled for Dec. 9-14 for customers of Government Camp. The new directory features a typical Oregon scene on the cover—a pastel-colored rainbow rising over golden fields.

Among major changes important to residents are new listings, including the Emergency First Aid and Hoodland Fire District

number which is 1-622-3124, and a new listing under Fire for the Forest Service, 1-622-3900.

The "Call Guide" section, which has a new format, also indicates telephone numbers to call when doing business with PNB, and includes a telephone number for the company's Lloyd Center and Clackamas Town Center PhoneCenter Stores. A company "Con-

sumer Information Guide" has also been revised and expanded.

The front cover photograph was shot by Alan D. St. John, a naturalist who lives in Eastern Oregon and winner of FNB's third directory cover photo contest. The rustic scene was taken in the Upper John Day Valley. St. John won \$1,500 for his efforts.

Applications being accepted

Applications for next year's summer and seasonal jobs in the Forest Service will be accepted from Dec. 1, 1981, to Jan. 15, 1982.

Applicants may submit only one application nationwide to a Forest Service Regional Office or Research Station. Applicants must be at least 18 years old at the time they report for duty and must be

capable of performing arduous work.

Jobs that will be available in the Pacific Northwest Region of the Forest Service (Oregon and Washington) are: Aids and technicians in forestry, range, recreation, fire control, engineering, surveying, and biological, physical, and hydrological sciences.

For other positions such

as clerks, wage grade (laborers), rappers, and smokejumpers, applicants should contact a National Forest or Research Station unit directly for information on when, where, and how to apply.

All applicants will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed, or national origin.

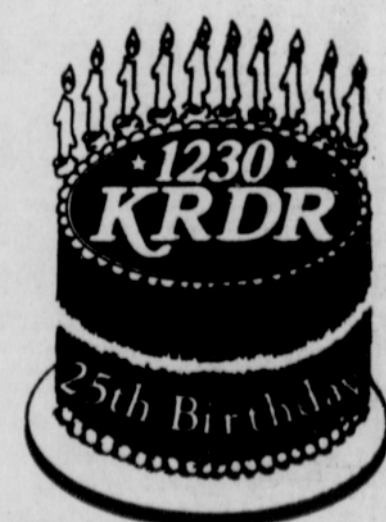

- Western Oregon: dig and divide rhubarb. (Should be done about every four years.)
- Spread wood ashes evenly on garden plot. Don't use more than 5 pounds per 100 square feet a year.
- Turn the compost pile.
- Mid-December in Western Oregon: first spray of peach trees with lime sulfur or approved fungicides to protect against peach leaf curl.
- Dormant sprays of lime sulfur or copper fungicide on fruit trees and roses for general disease control.
- Spray spruce trees with diazinon or lindane to control spruce aphids.
- Spray willow trees with approved fungicide to control twig blight.
- Western Oregon: good time of year to plant trees, landscape shrubs.
- Protect new landscape plants from wind: staking, guy wires, windbreaks, site selection.
- Yard sanitation: rake leaves, cut and remove withered stalks of perennial flowers, mulch flowerbeds, hoe or pull winter weeds.
- Check for rodent damage around base of trees and large shrubs.
- Western Oregon: still time to plant spring-flowering bulbs such as tulips, daffodils, hyacinths, crocus. Don't delay.
- Western Oregon: apply lime to Kentucky bluegrass lawns to maintain a soil pH of 6 to 7. (Rate: 50 to 80 pounds per thousand square feet.)
- During heavy rains, watch for drainage problems in the yard. Tilling and ditching are possible solutions.
- Poinsettia care: protect from cold, place in sunlight, don't let leaves touch cold windows; fertilize after 3 weeks.
- Prepare potting mix for new houseplants. Standard mix: one-third soil, one-third sand, one-third peat moss.
- Monitor houseplants for adequate watering, fertilizer, humidity. Water and fertilizer requirements are generally less in winter.
- Check stored flower bulbs, fresh vegetables, fruits for rot and fungus problems.
- Cut and dip holly for Christmas use.
- Make Christmas decorations from trees and shrubs in the yard.
- Consider garden-related Christmas gifts for the gardeners you know.
