4th-quarter rally falls short for SUHS

The Sandy girls were unable to sustain a fourth-quarter rally Friday night, and fell to Gresham 44-39.

Sophomore Sharon Jensen hit two 8- to 10-foot jumpers, and sophomore Jill Ingram contributed a free throw, to get the Pioneers within striking distance

Two free throws by junior Linda Mosbrucker with five minutes left in the game put Sandy within three, at 38-35.

After a key defensive rebound by senior Cindy McCoy, senior Dawn New connected on a 10 footer, getting Sandy within one, at 38-37.

Although Sandy had opportunities in the final few minutes, they were unable to capitalize, and the Pioneers' record dropped to 2-0. They lost the season opener to David Douglas 59-51.

"We've played well in two games," Coach John Smith said. "We made some mistakes that can be attributed to inexperience. Our season is dependent on our being able to correct those mistakes."

He said that although New scored 28 points against David Douglas, which is a school scoring record, that she had a more balanced game against Gresham.

"She mixed it up a little bit better than she did the other night," he said.

And, "She scored 17 points with people all over her all evening."

Smith said that she'll have to deal with the pressure all season, and is capable of doing that.

"She responded well to the pressure. She made some good one-on-one

moves, drew fouls, and fed the ball off well."

She had seven rebounds. Another encouraging sign for Smith was that when she couldn't get the rebound, she'd tip the ball away, keeping it live.

"Amy Aschoff has a ways to go," Smith said, "but I think she's going to be a point guard someday. 'S.e.'s a quick learner, and as the season goes on I expect her to get better and better."

He was encouraged by the fact that Jensen had 10 points, making her the team's second-leading scorer. Ingram and Jensen, both sophomores, "are doing as well as I expected, if not a little better."

"They're both applying good pressure defensively."

He was pleased that Mosbrucker made six free throws out of as many attempts, and said that McCoy rebounded well.

"For us to be successful, Cindy has to score more points," he added.

Turnovers have been

costly. The Pioneers lost the ball 31 times against David Douglas, and 25 times against Gresham.

"We've got to control that," Smith said.

He said that a lot of their games this year could revolve around their getting the ball down court without mistakes, and playing good defense.

"We've got some good team speed," he said. "We're just going to have to go in and mix it up with people."

Wrestlers take title on high-energy evening

There was a lot of energy in the air the night of the first Carey Larson Memorial Wrestling Tournament.

There was a high-spirited duel between Sandy and Columbia River Thursday evening with emotions getting a little out of control, and there was a touching moment at the close when Vern Larson presented the Pioneers with the team trophy.

The Columbia River 136-pounder, in a match with Sandy freshman Brent Kearney, got disqualified for flagrant misconduct after hitting Kearney twice in the face with the inside of his wrist.

A similar move, called a crossface, is allowed, but a wrestler must carry through with the move. The Columbia River wrestler had hit Kearney twice, and had drawn back a third time when Chuck Kearney, Brent's brother, jumped onto the mat and pushed the Columbia River wrestler back.

After the Columbia River wrestler was disqualified, the matches continued, with the Sandy wrestlers dominating in the upper weight classes.

Dan Martin pinned his opponent at the start of the third period. Cal McKinnis pinned his in a minute and 52 seconds.

Chuck Kearney, voted the tournament's outstanding wrestler by the coaches, pinned his opponent in 1:52. Scott Skipper got his fall in 3:25, and then Tim Systma, a heavyweight, got a come-from-behind victory by pinning his opponent.

Systma's opponent lost control after getting pinned, and struck the Sandy wrestler.

Shortly after that, after the last match had been wrestled, Coach Ron Calhoun got all the wrestlers to sit down on the west side of the SUHS gymnasium.

The spectators, on the east side, were able to hear what Calhoun told them as he spoke loudly.

He said he'd always bragged on wrestling, saying that that kind of thing never happens at wrestling matches.

When he was through the spectators applauded loudly. Individual and team trophies were awarded, and the evening came to a close.

Calhoun told The Post that several Columbia River wrestlers later apologized for what had happened.

"I've never seen that happen in wrestling before," Calhoun said. "It's just something that has never occurred."

"It takes more character to go out there and wrestle than anything else I know of. Wrestlers just have more character, and they just don't do those things."

"It was a very, very strange night."

Calhoun said that Columbia River has a good team, and he felt that the match would be closer than it was. As it turned out, the Pioneers won by almost 40 points.

"We're very physical in those upper weights," he said, pointing out that all those falls added up.

"I was really surprised and pleased with Calvin McKinnis, pinning all three of his opponents," Calhoun said.

"I expected Skipper to win, but I wasn't planning on him pinning everybody. But he had a good tournament, too."

He added, "I was real pleased to see John Cox win. He's one of those kids that's going to make a big difference. He's a good, powerful junior, and if he wins he's really going to get our team started right."

Wrestling after Cox, a 98 pounder, is Larry Topliff, a 106 pounder that is "almost always" good for a win.

"Bill Mathews had a good tournament," Calhoun said. The senior 123 pounder won his division.

Mike Rohweder "wrestled a couple of real good matches," Calhoun said. The one match he lost was to the winner of the recent "very prestigious" Pacific University Open.

About Brent Kearney, Calhoun said, "Even in losing, he was doing the things he was taught to do, and his body position was good. He did a fine job."

Mo Contreras, a junior 141 pounder, wrestled well, Calhoun said, adding that he's another wrestler that could make a big difference.

He said that junior varsity wrestler Loren Bateman "wrestled real well." He is a sophomore 157 pounder.
