Former Mount Hood forester to retire

Richard E. Worthington, regional forester for the Pacific Northwest, will retire Dec. 26, it was announced recently by R. Max Peterson, chief of the USDA Forest Service.

Worthington worked in the Mt. Hood National Forest as a district ranger, staff officer and deputy supervisor, from 1956 to 1965.

He has been regional

forester since June of 1977, coming to the post from national director of timber management in the Washington, D.C., headquarters of the Forest Service. His career spans 35 years.

The head of 24 and a half million acres in 19 National Forests in Oregon and Washington is a native of Oregon City.

He spent his career in Oregon, Washington, California and Washington, D.C.

He attended Stanford University and Oregon State University. He

graduated from OSU in 1950.

That same year he went to work in the Umpqua National Forest. In 1952 he was transferred to the Rogue River National Forest, and then in 1956 came to Mt. Hood.

In 1965 he was promoted to supervisor of the Olympic National Forest in 1965.

In 1968 he was named head of the Klamath National Forest in California.

In 1970, Worthington was named assistant regional forester in California, and later deputy regional forester. He went to

Washington, D.C., in 1973. Worthington, 58, is a veteran of the Army Air Corps in World War II.

NEW PENALTIES FOR SHOPLIFTERS

Oregon Law provides a civil penalty of at least \$100 plus criminal prosecution.

The 1979 Oregon Legislature enacted a new civil procedure and penalties statute which enables retail merchants to recover monetary penalties from shoplifters and parents of minor shoplifters.

The law allows the merchant to recover:

1. Actual Damages. In the amount of the retail value of the stolen items if they are not recovered. In the amount of damages to the items if recovered.

2. A Penalty. In the amount of the retail value of

the stolen merchandise, whether or not recovered, up to a maximum of \$500 (\$250 for parents).

3. An Additional Penalty. In the amount of not less than \$100 nor more than \$250.

This law became effective Oct. 3, 1979. It does not replace the criminal statute which designates most shoplifting as class-A misdemeanors, punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and imprisonment for not longer than one year.

Shoplifters now risk both civil and criminal action. Both laws are now in force in Oregon.

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
