

SUHS wrestlers handily take tournament title

The Pioneer wrestling team dominated the Roosevelt Wrestling Tournament last weekend, much to the surprise of Coach Ron Calhoun. On paper, he didn't figure Sandy to win its last match with Aloha as they expected them to be awesome in the top three weight classes. It turned into a pinning contest for the Pioneers, however, and they won 55-9. They beat Roosevelt 69-9, and Franklin 61-2. As a team they had 179 points, with Aloha taking second with 112. Franklin ended up with 74, and Roosevelt with 43. Calhoun said they had a good start, which might have made the difference against Aloha. They pinned four of the first five Aloha wrestlers. Mike Rohweder, a 130 pounder, pinned Mark Emery, who went to state last year. Tim Systma, Sandy's heavyweight, also pinned an Aloha

wrestler that has been to state. And, Randy Carmony, a 191 pounder, won 7-0 over an opponent that has been to state. Calhoun was pleased with Larry Toppliff, who wrestled up a weight class, at 115, and won 14-5 against a good Aloha opponent. He said that Carmony and Rohweder also wrestled exceptionally well. Carmony was pinned by Aloha's Ken Brown last year, but "completely dominated" Friday night. All in all, Sandy had 11 champions in the 13 weight divisions. They include Systma, Carmony, Toppliff, Rohweder, John Cox, a 98 pounder, Dave Kenison, a 115 pounder, Bill Mathews, a 123 pounder, Brent Kearney, a 136 pounder, Dan Martin, a 157 pounder, Calvin McKinnis, a 168 pounder and Chuck Kearney, a 178 pounder.

"I was very, very pleased," Calhoun said. "I'm not sure what happened there." He said that after they started winning in the lower weights, the other teams would just give up, or something. He said, "We pinned kids we shouldn't have pinned." He said that Franklin recently won a tournament, and won it handily. "I assumed they would be a very competitive team," Calhoun said. "Well, we won 61-2."

The wrestlers are ranked number two in the Oregonian's coaches poll. Calhoun seemed a little apprehensive about that.

"It doesn't take a whole lot to take a team from second place down to fifth, or whatever, you know."

The last home wrestling match before Christmas is tonight at 7 p.m. against West Linn. It's the Pioneers first league match.

"Traditionally they have a well-balanced, tough team," Calhoun said. "They usually don't have the real outstanding individuals, but every match is a good one."

Martin receives Foundation award

Dan Martin was the recipient of the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete award Monday night at the Hilton Hotel in Portland.

Martin, who has a 3.76 grade point average and is a 157-pound AAA state champion wrestler, has always been motivated, his father, Fred Martin, said.

He said there have been times when he's offered to take Dan to a ball game or a wrestling match, and he'd say he needed to study instead.

Fred Martin, Corbett Elementary principal, said that when they lived on a 30-acre farm in Redland one of Dan's responsibilities was to milk their two cows.

Dan was wrestling at USA Oregon in Portland at the time, and between milking the cows, wrestling and studying, he'd be up until midnight. Finally, he decided to give up the wrestling.

A lot of kids would have for something else to give up, Martin

said. Several SUHS underclassmen were taken to the banquet Monday night, and Martin feels that could have a good effect.

"A kid has to realize that (award) is within his grasp," Martin said.

Martin, the lineman representing the Timber Valley League, shared the spotlight Monday with Scott Fish of Oregon City, a TVL back.

When asked about the award, Dan Martin said that he was surprised, and then commented on the size of the linemen that received nominations from the other leagues (Wilamette Valley, Wilco, Metro and PIL).

Among the more than 900 that were there to applaud for the scholar-athletes were Governor Victor Atiyeh and Portland Mayor Frank Ivancich.

Darryl Rogers of Arizona State University was the speaker, and Martin received his award from Joe Avezzano, Oregon State University

football coach.

George Shaw, an All-American quarterback at the University of Oregon in 1954, was master of ceremonies.

"Dan Martin is an outstanding young man who represents his family, his school and the community well," said John McMahan, SUHS principal.

McMahan was at the banquet, and said that it was nice to see Martin receive the recognition he deserves. "He's performed at an exceptional level scholastically, and he has a hard schedule.

"He's an excellent example of what hard work will do for you," he said.

McMahan said that he really enjoys Martin's personality. "He's humble," he said. "He's not the kind of kid that flaunts it."

McMahan said that he agrees with the National Football Foundation's choice, adding that Martin is a proven leader.

"We're proud of him."

Kostrba invited to conference

SUSH Athletic Director Mike Kostrba has been appointed to a one-year term as vice-chairman of District 7 of the National High School Athletic Coaches Association.

He was recommended to the NHSACA "as a person of proven leadership, dedication, and enthusiasm for the high school coaching profession and for high school athletics," according to information provided by the NHSACA.

As vice-chairman, Kostrba will be asked to lead a workshop at the na-

tional convention in Indianapolis this summer, and will also get the opportunity to attend other workshops, as well as share common experiences and concerns with other athletic directors and coaches.

Kostrba is also secretary of the Oregon State High School Coaches Association. It is a position he was elected to two years ago. First, he serves as vice president, then secretary, and then president. Next year Kostrba will be president of the 2,400-member association.

Pioneer girls roll to second win; New sets scoring record

Senior Dawn New broke her own

scoring record Friday night, contributing 32 points to the Pioneers' 50-43 win over Wilson.

More importantly, the girls got their first win. And they followed it up with a 44-42 win over Hillsboro Tuesday, evening their record at 2-2.

Junior Linda Mosbrucker made a key five footer with about a minute and a half left in the game on an assist by sophomore Sharon Jensen.

"Sharon Jensen made some assists tonight that were unbelievable," Coach John Smith said, adding that she had her usual half-dozen steals.

He credited Mosbrucker with showing "excellent composure" against Hillsboro's press, which forced them out of the press in the second quarter, and perhaps made them hesitate before getting back into it at the end of the game, when they needed it.

New contributed "a decisive eight blocked shots," and Cindy McCoy again rebounded in double figures, pulling down 12.

He said that Kellie Garlock played well in relief.

"Becky (Rodrigues) is a senior guard with experience and is going to be very valuable this season," he added, saying that she went in a couple of times and did a good job.

"I think we've made a lot of progress," Smith said after they put Hillsboro's record at 3-2. "We've put together two very good games in a

row."

After the Wilson game, in which New scored 32 points, shooting 65 percent from the field, and made 11 rebounds, Smith said, "Not to downplay her scoring, but what really impressed me tonight was the fact that she had 11 rebounds, and probably a half a dozen times when she didn't get the rebound, knew she couldn't get it, she tipped it away from the defender to keep it alive."

Tuesday night all those blocked shots prompted Smith to say, "For awhile Hillsboro thought they were shooting into a Toss-Back (tradename for a net)."

Smith added that Jensen's play against Wilson was important. She contributed seven steals, four assists, seven rebounds and nine points.

He said that even though Ami Aschoff didn't have real impressive statistics, "she handled the ball well."

"She's starting to operate like a point guard."

He said that Mosbrucker's aggressive play contributes a lot to New and McCoy's success.

"The girls, I think, exhibited a lot of character and intensity," Smith said Friday night.

The girls have an away game with Jackson this Friday.

"Jackson is without a doubt a state

playoff team. They host as much talent as any team in the state.

"We're looking forward to playing a team of that caliber to really find out where we're at."
