

Increase in DUII arrests, ski season coincide

It is estimated that there are over 2,011 "potential killers" on Oregon's highways right now.

In Clackamas County there are many who will go unchecked because of budget reductions for the Oregon State Police.

These potential "killers" are intoxicated drivers who take to the roads every hour of every day and night.

On holidays and during ski season, the number of drinking drivers increase in the Mt. Hood area, according to Sergeant Dan Wolf, who is in charge of the OSP's Government Camp outpost. When the roads are icy or covered with snow, the situation is intensified.

The problem of getting the drunken driver off the road has been long debated in Oregon, as well as elsewhere.

One program that has recently been employed by the Oregon State Traffic Safety Commission and the OSP, is called "Operation REDDI." REDDI is an acronym for "Report Every Drunk Driver Immediately."

Persons seeing an intoxicated driver on the road can call a statewide toll-free number, 1-800-452-7888, and report the individual directly to an OSP dispatcher.

Mike Baldwin, administrator of the Traffic Safety Commission, said that despite the fact that the program is little more than two months old, and they're starting "from

ground zero," there have already been 105 calls to report drunken drivers.

Baldwin said that not every call that is made to REDDI results in an arrest because the responding officer must "see probable cause before they can take such an action."

During the first two months of the program's existence there were 16 calls that resulted in arrests.

"The police can't serve and protect us enough," said Baldwin, "but this volunteer program that utilizes the citizenry, can help. People can now assist both the state and local police agencies with problems in their area."

Baldwin said that his of-

fice is busy working with public service organizations, churches and schools, as well as through its own state agencies, to get the word about REDDI out.

Also, private industries such as Pacific Northwest Bell, Portland General Electric, Northwest Natural Gas, First State Bank and Weyerhaeuser, are assisting in notifying their employees of the new program.

In addition, Baldwin said that the Independent Insurance Agents Association, as well as Safeco, State Farm, and Oregon Mutual Insurance companies, have expressed support for the new pro-

gram. Representatives from these companies will be meeting with state officials in the near future to find out what they can do to assist.

Baldwin said that the Oregon Youth Traffic Safety Association at Oregon State University in Corvallis will be working in the local high schools to promote participation in the REDDI program.

The Oregon Highway Users Association, which is comprised of representatives of the trucking industry and bus companies, not to mention 29 other highway safety organizations, is said to be backers of this program.

Not missing any bases, Baldwin said the Oregon Liquor Control Commission will be attempting to get the word across to bartenders and educate them about Operation REDDI.

Both Baldwin and Sergeant Wolf said they feel confident people will participate in the program once they know that they can get the drunken driver off the road. Because people can call anonymously and escape any ramifications such as going to court to testify, this should convince them to use the toll-free number.

"Basically it's been proven time and time again," said Baldwin, "that drunk

drivers do kill and injure other people. This program is designed for concerned citizens to get involved and see something get done."

Captain Jim Phillips, assistant to the OSP's traffic division administrator, said that the program could be of benefit to the Mt. Hood area "because there is a major problem among the skiers, who do their share of drinking booze and driving."

"It's obvious that they (the skiers) contribute to the traffic problem in the area," said Phillips. "During the course of a day they can drink quite a bit, both before and during skiing, not to mention afterwards."

Baldwin agreed but said that the Sandy-Mt. Hood area isn't the worst area in the state for drunken drivers. He said that it could definitely be considered bad, but it isn't the worst.

Coos Bay and Springfield have the highest arrest rate of driving under the influence of intoxicants (DUII) in the state, as reflected by arrest and accident statistics.

"Anytime you can get the public involved in any kind of traffic safety program," said Phillips, "it not only helps the police, but also the driver. People who use the REDDI number will drive more defensively."

OFFER OF NON-COMPETITIVE AIRPORT LEASE OR 23999

PUBLIC LAND IN CLACKAMAS COUNTY

OREGON

BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT / U.S. DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

The notice of realty action dated February 25, 1981, is hereby modified as follows:

1. The lessee shall be charged the fair market rental but such rental shall not exceed one percent of the average annual gross receipts (AAGR) of sales and services related to the airport's operations. The initial rental shall be based on the past three years receipts. The lessee shall furnish the lessor with accurate accounting of these receipts.

2. The lessee may not use the lease area for any other use. The United States reserves the right to authorize secondary uses so long as they are compatible with the airport operation.

For a period of 45 days from the date of this notice, in-

terested parties may submit comments to the Secretary of the Interior (LLM-320), Washington, D.C. 20240. Any adverse comments on this modification will be evaluated by the Secretary of the Interior who may vacate or modify this realty action and issue a final determination. In the absence of any action by the Secretary of the Interior, this realty action will become the final determination of the Department of the Interior.

NOTICE OF REVIEW HEARING

On Wednesday, January 6, 1981, at the hour of 10:00 a.m., at the Courthouse Annex, 906 Main Street, Oregon City, Oregon, the Board of County Commissioners will consider a review of the Clackamas County Hearings Officer's denial of a Conditional Use request to construct a hydro-electric project utilizing a 12" intake line to divert water from an existing pond, a settling tank, a 12" penstock line to move the water a distance of 950' horizontal and 300' vertical and a pelton wheel turbine and alternator to be housed in a 12'x16' concrete block structure.

Unless otherwise provided by the Board of County Commissioners under Section 1304.05 of the Clackamas County Zoning Ordinance, the review of the decision shall be confined to the record of the proceedings before the Hearings Officer. The Board of County Commissioners may admit additional testimony and other evidence without holding a new hearing or hear the entire matter again. If it is satisfied that the testimony or other evidence could not have been presented at the initial hearing.

The party requesting review is Paul M. Sanders, the applicant is the same, file number 203-81-C/R

The review is for property generally described as follows:
