Kids are no. 1 to Sergeant Wolf

When Oregon State Policeman Dan E. Wolf, commander of the Government Camp outpost, isn't busy with work, scouting takes up a good part of his time.

Wolf, who was promoted to sergeant this fall, is on call 24 hours a day.

He spends what free time he has with his wife, Nancy, who works at Darr's Mountain Shop, and with his three children, who attend Welches School.

They are Michelle, 12, Leslie, 8, and Jon, 6.

Wolf, 38, first came to the Mt. Hood area when he was an 11-year-old. He said that when he was transferred from Pendleton to Government Camp, that "it was more or less just like coming home since I did a lot of my scouting in the Mt. Hood area."

That was in the winter of 1975, and Wolf, who had just been promoted from trooper to corporal, knew life on the mountain was going to be different.

In Pendleton he was involved in so many community organizations that he was busy nearly every night.

In Boy Scouts he served as an adult leader, a troop committeeman, unit commissioner, district commissioner, and a district chairman, with the responsibility of overseeing nine Boy Scout troops, four Explorer posts and 11 Cub Scout packs.

He also served on the Blue Mountain Council,

which oversees scouting operations in Southeastern Washington and Northeastern Oregon.

A lot of his time and energy was spent upgrading the camp at Wallowa Lake in Northeastern Oregon.

Wolf said he misses Pendleton and its organizations, but still gets back when he can, and will spend part of his vacation with the scouts ushering at the Pendleton Round-Up.

Now that Wolf is living and working at Government Camp, he is on the local committee for the scouting program in the Mt. Hood area.

One of the committee's recent tasks has been establishing a unique Explorer program which would focus on forestry, search and rescue, and other "high adventure" activities, including mountain climbing, skiing and hiking.

A post will be formed, according to Wolf, "as interest takes hold."

He said, "I love kids. My interest is youth. It's the most valuable resource that we, as a nation, have. Their moral upbringing is important to their growth as adults."

"Any time you can promote activities for youth in the community, you are promoting this. That's why I'm involved in scouting."

Wolf believes in scouting so much he's been involved with it for 27 years.

In addition to scouting, Wolf serves on the executive board of the local baseball association.

Completion of this course qualifies the soldier as a light-weapons infantryman and as an indirect fire crewman.

Soldiers were taught to perform any of the duties in a rifle or mortar squad.

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Drug abuse topic of PTA meeting

Nikki Johnson, a counselor with Comprehensive Options for Drug Abusers (CODA), will speak in the library at Welches Grade School Jan. 13 at 7:30 p.m.

The talk is being sponsored by the Welches PTA. Dawn Morrison, president of the PTA, said that the presentation is being held to make parents more aware of how children can become involved with drugs.

"Involvement and misuse of drugs can happen to people from every economic and social level, any age, race or sex," said Johnson.

She will speak for about an hour, and will deal with

four primary issues that parents are concerned about.

First, what is drug abuse and how can it be identified.

Secondly, what to do if you know your child is smoking pot.

Thirdly, what the facts about drugs are.

And finally, what kind of help is currently available.

The audience will learn about the CODA program, what it is and how it can help prevent drug abuse.

A question and answer period will follow the presentation.

Jeanine Bold's drama class will open the meeting by presenting some skits concerning drug abuse.

"A person can become dependent upon a wide variety of substances from tranquilizers to sleeping pills, from stimulants to pain killers, and even some chemicals we do not commonly consider drugs," Johnson said.

Morrison said that due to the subject matter, the meeting will be for adults.

Morrison said that if Johnson is well received the PTA will ask the school administration about having her speak to the students.
