

Wildlife department needs to collect fish tags

Salmon-steelhead tags for 1981 are expired and the Department of Fish and Wildlife is urging anglers to turn them in as soon as possible.

The catch information recorded on the tags is the basis for catch estimates used by the department in its management programs. The data is statistically expanded to give catch for each month on each stream in the state that has salmon or steelhead runs.

In recent years, tag returns have averaged between 20 and 25 percent, but a larger return would be better. The more tags

returned, the better the base of information and the more accurate estimates can be.

Even tags from anglers who did not fish or who fished but did not catch anything are important and should be returned.

Tags can be dropped into the cardboard boxes provided at license agencies where tags are sold, or they may be simply mailed to the department's Portland office.

If you want an opportunity to hunt a wild turkey gobbler this spring, now is the time to apply for one of the 600 tags that have been

authorized by the Fish and Wildlife Commission. Applications for April turkey gobbler hunts will be accepted by the department through Feb. 3.

Those who wish to apply must have a 1982 hunting license. Application cards may be purchased from a license agent or at the Portland headquarters of the department. Up to two hunters may apply on one card and the license agent will charge a \$1 application fee for each person.

Instructions for applying can be found in the 1981 synopsis of Oregon Game Bird Regulations.

The drawing for permits will be held Feb. 12, and notification to successful

applicants will be mailed following the drawing. Those who are successful will receive a billing for the \$2 tag.

The 600 tags are spread over five separate hunting areas. Two hunts are scheduled in each area.

Three areas are located in Wasco and Hood River counties south of The Dalles. The old South White River Area is split into two separate areas to spread hunting pressure more effectively. Another large hunt area, the Northeast area, consists of all the state east of the John Day River and north of U.S. Highway 26.

The Merriam's turkey

reigns as king in all these areas, established from releases in the early 1960s. Our birds came from Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico.

The fifth hunting area is in southwestern Oregon

near Medford. Hunts in this area are for the Rio Grande turkey which is becoming

established from releases of 20 birds in 1975. Those original birds came through the generosity of the California Department

of Fish and Game. The birds were trapped in the northern part of the state and released into similar habitat in Jackson County.

The birds took hold and have been steadily increasing in numbers since then.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has agreed to provide more birds and they will be released in other southwest Oregon areas in attempts to widen the distribution of this bird as quickly as possible.

Pioneer girls win league opener

The Sandy girls basketball team downed Estacada 38-29 to get a good start on its league schedule.

New's basket at the end of the first quarter gave the team a lift, according to Smith. New received the inbounds pass at about mid-court and drove down the

sideline, finally sinking a long shot from the side as the buzzer sounded.

Estacada came prepared for the high-scoring New, however. She was held to six points.

New and Linda Mosbrucker played a good part of the second half with four fouls.

"As Dawn got in foul trouble, Kellie Garlock went in off the bench and played very well," Smith said.

Cindy McCoy again dominated the boards. She had 14 rebounds.

The girls basketball team, like other Sandy teams, has had a longer than expected Christmas layoff. "We neally never did get in our game," Smith said, "except toward the end we ran some."

Near the end of the game Mosbrucker and Jensen

each got off three-point plays.

The girls have some tough league games coming up, including a game at Sweet Home tonight. Sweet Home, with a 6-1 record, is probably one of the top twenty teams in the state, according to Smith.

Chess is hard work, but fun

The finals of the 1982 Dr. Chess Invitational Chess Tournament will again be held at the award-winning Forest Inn at Alder Creek.

The final two rounds of the five-round event will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Forest Inn on Jan. 27. The first three rounds will take place next Wednesday, Jan. 20, at the Faubion Road Gentlemen's Club.

The event is sponsored by the Mt. Hood Chess Club and hosted by Rick Estes, owner of the Forest Inn.

"I really enjoy having the tournament here and putting on a spread of refreshments for these peo-

ple," Estes said. "They really work hard at their games, but seem to have a lot of fun, too."

Cal Bertram, organizer of the annual event, said, "This will be the 18th year that the Dr. Chess has been held. It started in Tacoma, Wash., in 1963 with six participants."

"Because of time limitations, we have not been able to have more than 12. That is how many we have invited this year," he said.

Roger Ford, teacher and chess coach at Sandy High School, is among those invited. Other participants include Leonard Berreman

and Mike Winn of Brightwood; Dave Enna, Dan Flood and Randy Hendricson of Zigzag; Pat Foley, Will Frank and Bill Niemeyer of Welches; Peter Giorano of Government Camp; Clyde Slensing of Alder Creek, and Jim Rogers of Portland.

"It should be a real battle royal for the four top prizes," Bertram said.

First prize will be a trophy and a solid maple and walnut chess board, donated by local wood craftsman Ken Coulling. Second prize is a chess book and half the prize fund. Third prize is a chess book and a quarter of the prize fund. Fourth prize, the Dr. Chess Award, is one-fourth of the prize fund.

Each of the players pay a \$3 entry fee to make the money prizes.

The first three rounds at the Faubion Road

Gentlemen's Club "will be closed to the public because of the limited time to play three rounds and space restrictions," Bertram said. "The final two rounds at the Forest Inn are open to the public and they are certainly invited to come and watch some spirited chess."
