Council seeks commission member

In an abbreviated session Monday night, the Sandy City Council approved the use of Meinig Park this summer by the Sandy Mountain Festival and renominated a member of the Sandy Planning Commission.

The council also will move into Meinig Park on Friday, July 9, to set up for the weekend arts and crafts extravaganza which annually draws some 50,000 visitors to the city. Festival days will be July 10 and 11.

The council also renominated Dick Har-

rison to a four-year term on the planning commission.

The appointments of Harrison and Monte Schnepf expired Jan. 1. Schnepf, however, recently resigned from the commission because he has moved out of the city of Sandy and the urban growth bound-

dary.
