Sweet Home edges SUHS wrestlers

Tim Sytsma wrestled competitively for only 10 seconds last week.

That's how long it took the Sandy heavyweight to pin his opponent last week at Sweet Home. The win gives him a 20-0 record.

As a team, the Pioneers fell last Thursday, 31-28. The score was 28-6 by the time the wrestlers in the heavier weights, beginning with Dan Martin, took to the mat.

Martin's opponent was described by Coach Ron Calhoun as a "tough kid, but not an outstanding wrestler. Just a scrapper."

Martin won by a fall. Chuck Kearney got his record to 20-0 with a 15-5 win. He wrestled a "big, powerful kid," said Calhoun.

"But as the match progressed we wore him down. The kid got pretty battered up," he said.

"As a matter of fact, they hauled him off to the doctor to get his shoulder checked. He got bumped around so much that they weren't sure he was all together."

Cal McKinnis wrestled up at 178. He trades off with Kearney, with Kearney often taking the tougher opponent as he can use the competition.

But, said Calhoun, "It doesn't make any difference, Cal pins 'em either way."

"We really surprised the Sweet Home coach because they didn't think that could ever happen (McKinnis's first-period pin).

"Of course, they surprised us at 191 because I didn't think that would happen, either."

Randy Carmony, Sandy's 191 pounder, was downed 4-1. Carmony is now 19-3.

Martin is 19-1 and McKinnis is 18-2.

In the five upper weight divisions, Sandy is 96-6. Calhoun was not displeased with those in the lower weights.

He said that Mel Gedde, a 106 pounder, showed a lot of heart. Robert Paul, in his first outing, ran into one of Sweet Home's tougher wrestlers at 130.

Randy Swanson, at 115, ran into a state champion. That's the second state champion, and third state qualifier, he's faced since Christmas.

Mike Rohweder, wrestling up a weight class at 136, came through for Sandy, pinning a good opponent in the first round.

Mike Sheppard went from second varsity 136 pounder to varsity 141 pounder. "He has a lot of heart," Calhoun said. "He,

even, is injured. We're just nothing but the walking wounded around here."

The Pioneers have a dual with Oregon City this afternoon, and then will host Estacada tonight.

Next Thursday they'll travel to Silverton for a dual. After that, it's the district meet.

Calhoun is hoping some of the injuries plaguing the team will heal up in the next week or two.

Larry Topliff, Sandy's standout 106 pounder, will be back in action today. He has frayed cartilage in his knee.

Free throws key to SUHS win

The Pioneer girls got a needed win over Molalla Thursday night, with Kellie Garlock and Sharon Jensen making their fourth-quarter free throws.

The girls fell to West Linn Monday night, putting them in a three-way tie for fourth in the Timber Valley League.

Coach John Smith said the Molalla game was a good one for them in that they learned they could come back.

They trailed until the fourth quarter. Jensen made a steal and a layup a few minutes into the stanza, getting Sandy within one, at 35-34.

A free throw by Cindy McCoy tied it up, and Garlock put the Pioneers ahead by converting on both ends of a one-and-one.

After another steal and layup by Jensen, a key rebound by Ami Aschoff, and a free throw by Dawn New, Sandy had a 40-35 lead.

After trading a few turnovers and a few trips to the free throw line, Sandy had a three-point lead. With 25 seconds to play Jensen converted a one-and-one into two points, and a 44-39 lead.

New blocked a shot, and Jensen grabbed the loose ball and headed down court for yet another layup. This time, however, she was fouled.

She made both of her shots from the line, with 11 seconds left in the game, to put the final score at 46-39.

All in all, Jensen made five of six free throws in the fourth period. She was six of eight for the evening, and had six steals.

Garlock made four free throws out of as many attempts in the fourth quarter.

McCoy contributed 17 rebounds, and New grabbed 11.

Rebounding was a key, Smith said, adding, "I don't think they (Molalla) got any offensive rebounds in the fourth quarter."

He said that they played well defensively.

Turnovers were a problem first half, but that problem was eliminated second half.

"With the running game we try to incorporate, we try to push the ball down court, we're going to have some turnovers," Smith said.

McCoy, with her 13 points and 17 boards, had an "exceptional game."

Smith added, "Dawn had seven blocked shots (and) continues to help us out defensively in that category. She really plugs up the middle."

Against West Linn things didn't go as well. Jensen was in foul trouble almost immediately, and other players didn't turn in top performances.

However, Linda Mosbrucker again scored in double figures, with 12.

The Pioneers travel to Estacada tonight.

"For two years they've had their best games against Sandy," Smith said. He added he doesn't think it'll be any different tonight.
