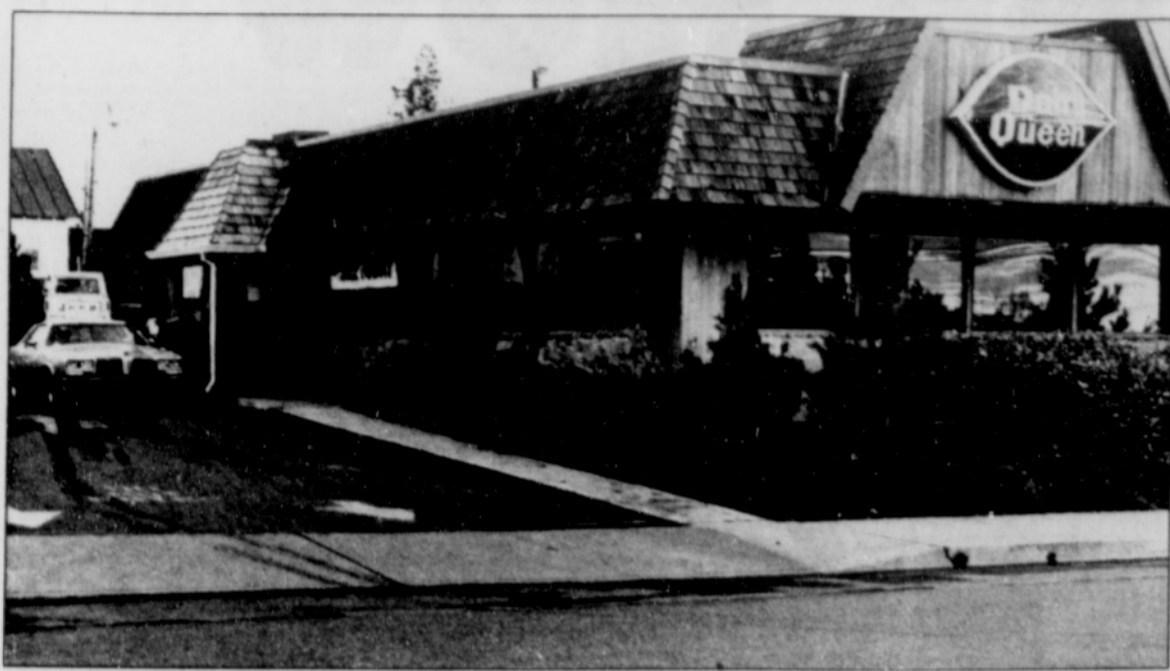

## Library offer business resources

The Sandy Public Library wants to get bullish on business.

To introduce local business people to what it has to offer, the librarians are putting on the coffee and inviting them to visit the library this Monday, Feb. 22, to review the facili-

ty's business sources. The coffee will be on from 2 to 6 p.m.

The library now features books on advertising and marketing, business directories, books on law and foreign language dictionaries.

What sources they don't

have, library personnel can probably get through 37 public, educational, medical or law libraries in the Clackamas County-wide Cooperative Network, or through the interlibrary loan system that literally reaches around the world.

A complete selection of

reference works and periodicals are also available to assist local business people seeking answers to their business questions.

The library carries almanacs, encyclopedias, local municipal codes and the Oregon Blue Book. Periodicals available include the Wall Street Journal, Oregon Business and Harvard Business Review.

## Two Post editors honored

The Sandy Post has won honorable mention certificates in two journalism categories in a national contest sponsored by Newspaper Editorial Workshop of Florida.

Editor Dan Dillon won first honorable mention in news writing, a contest for weekly newspapers of less than 6,000 circulation won by Tom Leathers of The

Former Post editor Mark Floyd, now assistant sports information director at Oregon State University, won first honorable mention in newspaper photography. The contest for American weekly newspapers with less than 6,000 circulation was won by Richard Creed of Meade County Times-Tribune in Sturgis, S.D.

Earlier The Post won general excellence and typographical (layout) recognition in the 1980 journalism contest.

Also in 1980 competition, The Post won honors from National Newspaper Association and the state press association which rated The Post best mid-sized weekly paper in Oregon for the second consecutive year.

## Registration deadline extended

If you're 18 years of age or older, male and you were born after Jan. 1, 1960, Uncle Sam wants you.

Male U.S. citizens and aliens permanently residing in the United States who meet those qualifications are required to register for the draft or face a penalty. The same goes for men born in 1964. They must register within 30 days of their 18th birth-

day. Registration may be accomplished at the U.S. Post Office.

On Jan. 7, President Ronald Reagan announced his decision to continue peacetime selective service registration.

In announcing his decision, Reagan declared a grace period during which late registrations would be

accepted without penalty, but it is almost over. The grace period is over at the end of February.

Anyone who was required to register previously, but hasn't done so, is reminded that he must register immediately to avoid any possible penalty. Failure to register carries a maximum penalty upon conviction of five years in prison, a \$10,000 fine or both.

If you're interested in knowing who has signed up, the Selective Service is

continuing to make available lists of men who have registered and their tentative local board assignments. The list for Sandy area residents is available at the Clackamas County Courthouse in Oregon City.

The lists cover registrations processed through Sept. 30, 1981 and include men born in 1960, 1961, 1962 and 1963.

Local board assignments are arranged by ZIP code based on permanent address.

## State lays down law on political signs

With primary election campaigns starting soon, the Highway Division this week reminded candidates that their are regulations governing temporary political signs visible to state highways.

Rules provide that temporary political signs may be erected on private property. They, however, are not permitted on highway right-of-way, on trees, utility poles, on right-of-way fence posts or natural features, in protected areas of the Interstate System, in designated scenic areas or park lands.

The installation of signs from controlled access highways right-of-way is not permitted.

The maximum permissible size for a temporary political sign is 32 square feet, which includes the front and rear sides.

Any signs erected under

these provisions must be removed within 30 days after the election.

Federal regulations permit only official signs on state highway right-of-way, and any temporary political signs located in these areas will be removed without notice.

Signs are also subject to regulations dealing with appearance and condition, and regulations concerning removal and disposition of non-conforming signs.
