## Van donated to center

The Hoodland Senior Center has received a van to assist in the transportation of clients, according to Maxine Worley, the agency's director.

Worley said that last fall the center worked out an agreement with the Canby Senior Center to share a 1972 Bonneville Sportvan. The vehicle was to be used for providing services for such things as grocery shopping, direct service transportation, field trips, as well as other recreational and center activities. Last month, however, the Canby Senior Center purchased a new van, and the 1972 van was acquired by

Loaves and Fishes. They, in turn, donated it to the Hoodland Center. The van can accommodate up to ten persons, said Worley, runs well and has excellent upholstery. It is painted blue with white trim and has "Hoodland Senior Center" painted on it with white lettering. Worley said that Lenore Richards has been hired as the center's driver, which is a part-time position.

## Commissioners visit site early, locals upset

Seven persons that planned on touring the Alderwood site, where a 192-unit mobile home subdivision in the Brightwood area is proposed, were upset with the Clackamas County Commissioners when they failed to show up.

On Feb. 22 commissioners agreed to schedule a visit to the 48-acre site to examine wetlands and streams. That visit was set for March 6 at 2:30 p.m.

However, a day prior to the visit, the time was moved up a half hour, unbeknownst to any of these residents.

Some of them had arranged for time off work to walk with the commissioners, members of the planning staff, and the attorneys for both the developers and the opposition.

A half hour after the two attending commissioners had departed from the Brightwood Store, the designated meeting place, seven residents gathered. At close to 2:40 p.m. they were tipped off that the commissioners were

already walking through the site.

Brightwood resident Dwight Englert and his wife, Regina, both feel that the meeting change was deliberate, that it was done in order to exclude citizens from observing the site visit.

They said that although no new testimony could be given, the participation of residents in the walk was important and that they, as taxpayers, had the right to be present.

Phil Clark, of the Environmental Committee on Suitability, whose organization has opposed the development since last summer, said that he was notified last week of the date, place and time, and that the county commissioners were aware that he and another resident would be present to insure that specific locations in the area would be viewed.

He said that he was not notified of the change in meeting time.

Robert Stephens, whose property borders the development area, took time off work from his construction job to show the

commissioners the wetlands that he had testified about at the hearings.

He located Commissioners Ralph Groener and Robert Schumacher after they were nearing the completion of their inspection.

Doug McClain, a planner with the Department of Environmental Services, and attended the site visit.

He said that the commissioner were not required to notify residents since it was not a public hearing.

Englert said the incident is typical of other meetings held by the county, which are held at times that make it difficult for working people to attend.

He said that they are usually held "during work-

ing hours on weekdays, not on weekends, when most people could attend."

Ms. Englert said that "the commissioners seem to be turned off to public input."

"They won't listen to the people's views, just the developers'," said Englert. "Today was a good example."

## Man arraigned, case to go to trial

A Government Camp man has been indicted on charges stemming from an injury to a Camp Creek woman on Dec. 27 after he struck her with his vehicle, according to Janine O'Neill of the Clackamas County district attorney's office.

O'Neill, a deputy district attorney, said that Robert Marshall of Government Camp was indicted on Feb. 11 by a Clackamas County Grand Jury, and warrants were issued for his arrest.

He is charged with assault in the third degree (a class C felony), recklessly endangering another person, and driv-

ing while under the influence of intoxicants.

According to the Oregon State Police, Marshall struck Barbara Schmaling of Camp Creek with his car after a dispute over a parking space outside the Huckleberry Inn in Government Camp.

After the grand jury made its decision, Forest Bacci, deputy district attorney, contacted by Marshall's attorney, and arrangements were made for Marshall to turn himself in through his legal counsel.

On Feb. 25 Marshall was arraigned and the case is set to go to trial.
