

Gresham man seeks court seat

Former State Senator Vern Cook last week announced that he intends to seek election to the Oregon Supreme Court.

He is filing for the position now held by Judge J.R. Campbell, Position 4. Campbell was appointed by Gov. Vic Atiyeh Dec. 1, 1980 and is serving out the term resulting from the resignation of Judge Howell which ends Jan. 3, 1983.

Cook served 24 years in the Oregon Legislature and has practiced law since 1952. His past public service also includes terms as Gresham city judge and Troutdale city attorney.

Cook was chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee during the 1979 legislative session. He was a member of the Judiciary or Criminal Law Committees during each session he served except the 1967 session. That committee usually handles legislation especially pertinent to the operation of the court system and the administration of justice.

Cook was involved in the 1979 legislation which adopted the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure,

the 1981 adoption of the new Oregon Evidence Code and amendments to Oregon's anti-trust law.

Litigation which Cook handled as a lawyer includes the 1961 Re-portionment suit and Pense vs. Corbett, a case involving run-

ing for more than one lucrative office.

He was the plaintiff and successful appellant in the landmark elections case, Cook vs. Corbett. That case established the ground rules for election contests based on campaign misrepresentations.

The Gresham lawyer said in announcing his candidacy, "Our founding fathers wisely provided for the election of justices of the Supreme Court. Since the resignation of Judge Howell in December of 1980, Position 4 has been held by an appointee of the governor.

"I believe the people of Oregon are entitled to a choice of candidates. During my 30 years as a member of the Oregon Bar, my 24 years as a member of the legislature and my nine years of service as a city judge or attorney, I have had the opportunity to develop an extensive legal background.

"This will be an important asset for service on the Oregon Supreme Court," Cook said. "I believe I can do a good job for the people of Oregon in this high position."

Boring woman enters Congressional race

A Boring woman filed last Friday for the Democratic nomination for Oregon's newly-created 5th Congressional District.

State Senator Ruth McFarland previously announced her intention to run for the 5th Congressional District seat but was interrupted by her service on the State Revenue committee before and during the Oregon Legislature's special session.

In her campaign, McFarland said, she will emphasize putting people back to work.

"Because of the Reagan administration's economic policies which have all been supported by my apparent Republican opponent, the current recession has given Oregon the fourth highest unemployment rate in the country," the candidate said.

"We must have national policies that put Oregonians back to work and I will work vigorously for

such policies," McFarland said.

McFarland is a science instructor at Mt. Hood Community College, holding a doctorate in genetics from the University of Oregon. She is currently the state senator representing District 12, East Multnomah and Clackamas counties.

During the 1981 Legislative session, McFarland served on the Human Resources-Aging, Insurance-Banking-Retirement, Agriculture and Natural Resources, and Revenue committees and served as the vice chair of the Education committee.

During the interim, McFarland chairs the Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources and is a member of the committees on Education-Labor, Data Processing, Executive Appointments as well as the Joint Committee on Revenue.

Pioneer group slates historical society head

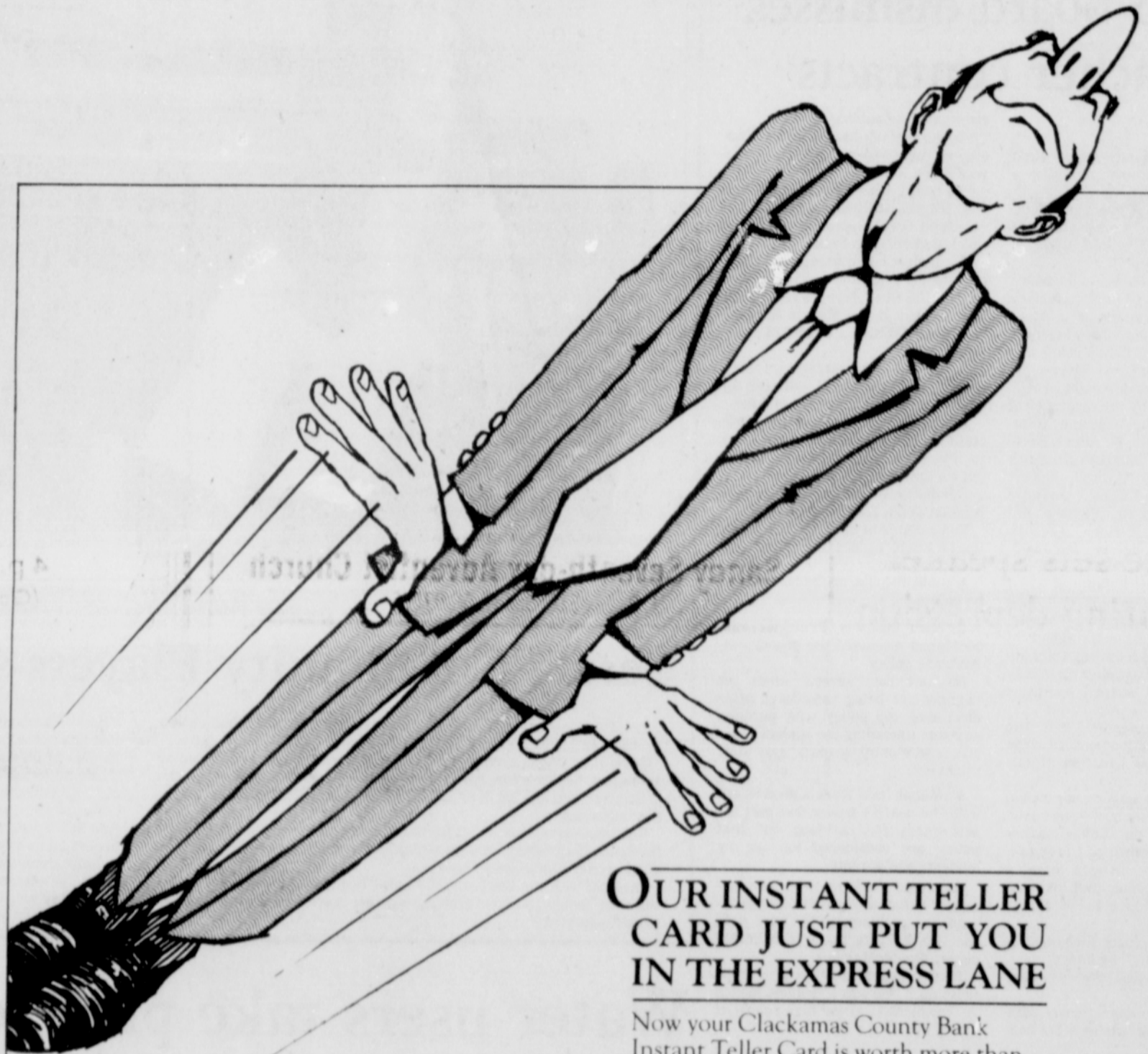
Tom Vaughn, director of the Oregon Historical Society, will address the March meeting of the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers.
