The I-205 bridge has been called "the first of a new generation" by Engineering News-Record, a major weekly construction magazine. Bignall has become a specialist in this type of bridge construction. He has just become general foreman for the construction of the same type of bridge across the Columbia River at Pasco, Wash.
