

Firefighters keep busy as blaze damages roof

A defective chimney above a wood stove started a blaze which damaged the roof on a Sandy home early last Sunday afternoon.

Sandy Fire Marshal Jim Gallagher said 26 firefighters responded to a 1:14 p.m. alarm at the Dan York residence, 41151 SE Vista Loop Drive, only to find fire already burning through the roof when they arrived.

Smoke had been visible from the intersection of Highway 26 and Langensand Road, he noted.

He said the firefighters, using three engines and two tankers, had the flames under control within 15 minutes.

Gallagher said the fire began in an attic directly above a wood stove and caused \$8,000 to \$10,000 damage to the house and its contents.

Cause of the blaze was inadequate clearance between the metal chimney and cedar shingles.

During the past week, in addition to the house fire, Sandy Fire District personnel responded to a chimney fire, one vehicle fire which turned out to be a broken radiator hose and four

automobile accidents.

There were also six first aid calls, one smell of smoke, one public assist and two mutual aid calls with Boring Fire District.

Through February, the Sandy Fire District was ahead of its 1981 pace with 26 more emergency calls.

This year, the district has responded to 32 fires, 10 public assistances, seven false alarms, 81 emergency medical calls and 13 mutual aids with adjoining fire districts.

SLOGAN CONTEST

The volunteers of Sandy Fire District are sponsoring a fire prevention slogan contest for school-age children who live within the Sandy district, Gallagher said.

Winning slogans will be displayed on the sides of district fire trucks.

Health board taps Day

Sandy Building Official Tom Day was appointed last Thursday to the newly-formed Health Advisory Board by the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners.

Day was happy at the appointment. "I think it's good to get some representation from East County on some the boards down in Oregon City," he said.

The new board will review Health Division policies and provide direction for planning and evaluation of programs.

The board will also look at providing preventative

health services and coordination of health issues with providers, consumers and agencies. One of the most immediate issues for consideration is to develop a community plan for dealing with illness care for the poor and needy.

The first Health Advisory Board meeting will be March 30 at 5 p.m. at the Clackamas County Courthouse, 907 Main St., Oregon City.

Others named to the board include John Cleland, Oregon City physician; John Cutter, Molalla pharmacist; Joanne Hazel,

Oregon City nurse and community volunteer; John Mayfield, attorney with Legal Aid Services; Carleton Lindgren, Meridian Park Hospital administrator; Roy Payne, Molwauck internist; Diana Taylor, Lake Oswego nurse practitioner, and Thomas Dillon, Canby Herald publisher. Members are appointed for three-year terms.

Sandy man makes plea on harassment charge

A Sandy man is scheduled to appear today in Canby Municipal Court to enter a plea on a harassment charge stemming from an incident at the Timber Valley League wrestling tournament.

Arthur Skipper is accused of harassing a wrestling referee.

The charge against Skipper accuses him of "unlawfully and with the intent to harass, annoy and alarm Vynn C. Berg, subject (him), to offensive physical contact, to-wit; by

hitting him with open hands and pushing him in a manner likely to provoke a violent or disorderly response."

Berg refereed a match in which Skipper's son, Scott, a junior at Sandy Union High School, lost a 5-3 decision following a "flagrant" penalty that ended the match seconds before regulation time expired.

The alleged harassment took place Feb. 20, the night of the district wrestling finals at Canby.

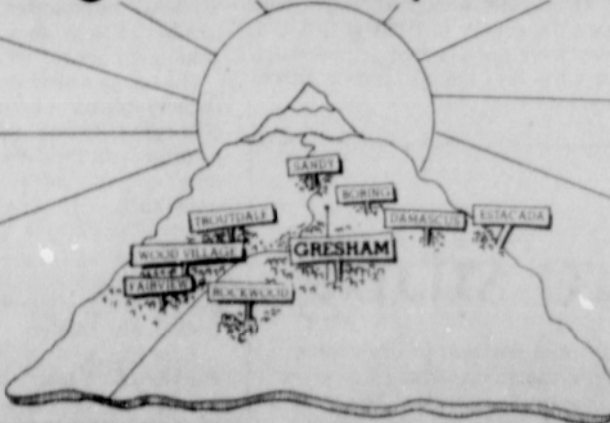

Submitted to the legal voters of said district. SANDY ELEMENTARY DISTRICT #46 OPERATING LEVY QUESTION: Shall the Sandy Elementary District levy \$2,264,428, outside Oregon's Constitutional limitation for operating expenses during the 1982-'83 fiscal year? PURPOSE: The establishment of this levy is for funding the educational programs for the children of the district in grades one through eight. The Cedar Ridge, Firwood, Kelso, and Sandy Elementary buildings are included in this operating proposal. The district does not have a tax base to provide the educational program required by the State Constitution and State Statute and as adopted by the District board, therefore, this operating levy is being presented for voter approval. If this measure is approved, \$1,803,419 of the taxes levied in the 1982-'83 fiscal year are eligible for partial state funding. However, \$461,009 of the taxes will be totally financed by local taxpayers without any partial state payment.
