The click of castanets, the stomp of a well-placed heel can mean only one thing—flamenco dancing.

Evelyn McLellan, a Sandy resident known for her dance instruction in local community schools, is now appearing with Ballet Fiesta, a Portland-based professional Spanish dance company. The group will open April 4 at the Norton House Restaurant in Portland's Old Town.

Flamenco, the music and dance of the Gypsies of the Andalusian district in southern Spain, dates back to the 14th century.
