

Area CPOs to meet to discuss plan updates

The Board of County Commissioners has responded to the concerns of the residents and the area's citizens planning organizations, and have extended the time line for revisions of the Mt. Hood Community

Plan. After receiving complaints from the Rhododendron Neighborhood Group, the newly-recognized Mt. Hood Corridor CPO, Commissioner Robert Schumacher directed the planning staff to allow 60 additional days for

citizen's input. On April 14 members of the planning staff will meet with representatives from the areas CPOs to discuss the process to be used in the plan update, as well as concerns with the process of citizen input and participation.

CPO members have said the proposed revisions of the plan, as recommended by the county, excluded such input.

The meeting will be held at the Hoodland Women's Club and will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Following this meeting

three citizen information meetings are scheduled to be held, and will be moderated by Ardis Stevenson, assistant planning director.

Earlier this year Stevenson was awarded the 1981 Professional Planning Award for her work in

citizen participation in the planning process in the county.

The first citizen information meeting is scheduled for April 20 to discuss the staff's recommendation for revising the Mt. Hood Community Plan.

On May 27 a second informational meeting is

scheduled so that area residents can hear the proposed revisions in the local plan, which will be going before the Planning Commission in June for a public hearing.

In addition, citizens will be given information concerning public input at both the planning commission meeting and the plan hearing, which will be held by the commissioners.

On June 14 the planning commission will hold a public hearing at the Women's Club at 7:30 p.m. to review plans as recommended by the planning staff.

The commissioners will hold a hearing on the planning commission's recommendations on July 7. The hearing will begin at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. and will also be held at the Women's Club.
