A workshop on computers and a speak-off will be featured when the Sandy Business and Professional Women's Club hosts the district conference this Saturday, April 17.

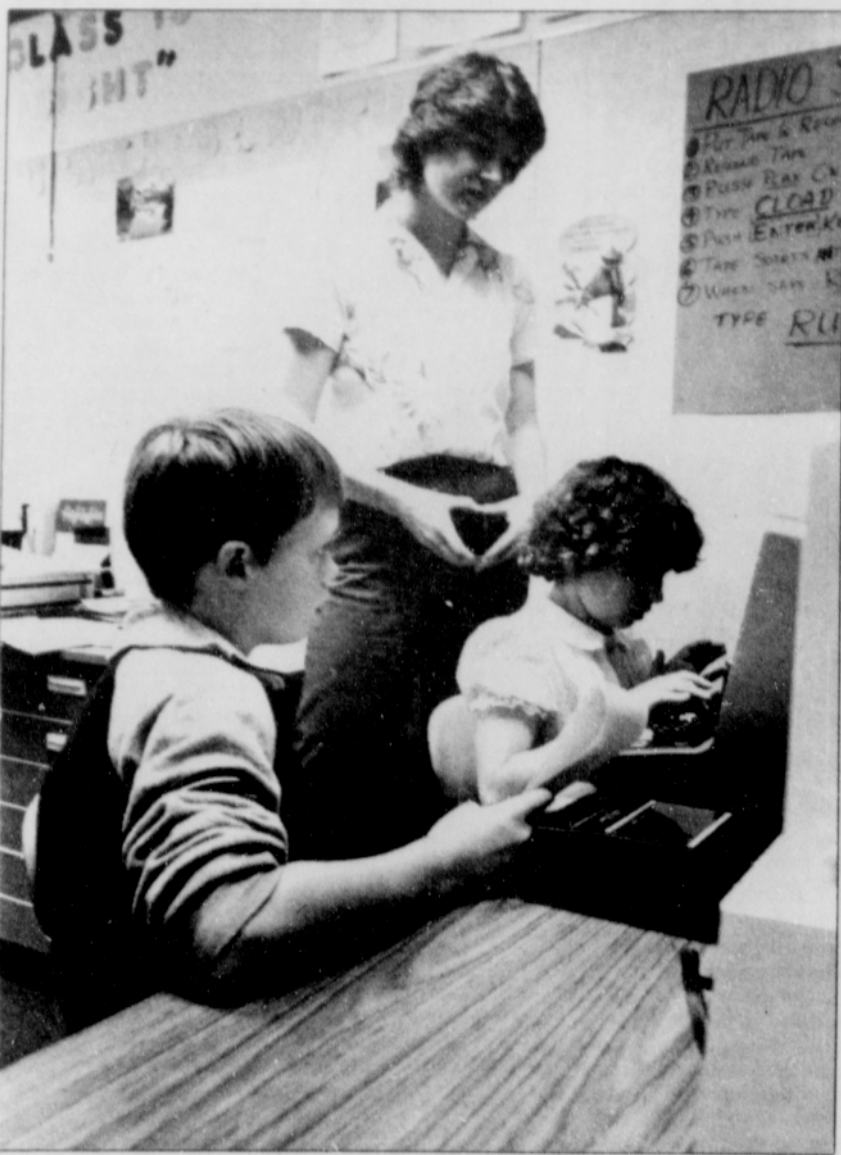

The Young Careerist Speak-off begins at 11:30 a.m. and will feature a speaker from each district vying for the right to go to state competition.

After lunch, Kari Rohr and Kim Wilcox will present a computer workshop. "Their main concern is that everything's computer-related and they want to know more about this," explained Rohr. The pair will provide insight into micro-computers for business use and computers for home use.

Following their discussion, conference attendees will have a chance to get some hands-on experience, working with general ledgers and word processing so that they will have a better understanding of what the computers can do.

Rohr, a fifth-grade teacher at Firwood School, uses a Radio Shack TRS-80 and Pet computer in her classroom and has

Montessori growth pleases teachers

Overall, directors of the Child's Kingdom Montessori School are happy with the progress their school has made in its first year of operation.

"To start with four students and grow to four times that many is nice," said Hank Hudson, one of four instructors at the school. "Also, we reached

our goal to get certified." With the quadrupling in class size, the school also sought a new meeting place. Formerly situated in an apartment on Gerilyn Court, the school now meets in the lower level of the Masonic Hall.

With a capacity of 30 students per session, both morning and afternoon, the

directors want to give the Montessori message to more and more parents. This Tuesday, April 20, the school will host an open house at 7 p.m. in the lower level at Masonic Hall on Pioneer Boulevard. A slide presentation will be shown to explain the principals of the Montessori educational system and enlist support for next school year.

The faculty will split next year with Avis Grudi and Sue Hanson handling the teaching chores. Hank and Cheryl Hudson are in the process of opening a new school in LaGrande.

All the teachers were certified, as well as the school, this year by the National Educational Services for Montessori Instruction.

Basically, the Montessori method utilizes a "hands-

on" approach to education. The students meet at the opening of each session in the circle area where they share stories and have show-and-tell.

They then have work time, moving through a series of work stations where they learn practical skills, such as tying, buttoning, pouring; sensorial skills, using all senses but taste; mathematic skills, such as counting and addition; language skills, such as spelling, and cultural skills, such as telling time, science and art.

Play time follows, as well as a snack, and the students complete the day working on science, geography, language, foreign language, music and art.

SSI payments take new tack

Sandy residents who receive supplemental security income should know that, starting this month, the way SSI payments are figured has changed.

Dee Pigsley, Social Security field representative, said that under the old law, the amount of the SSI payment due a person was figured on the basis of calendar months, three-month periods starting January, April, July and October.

The person's total income for the quarter was totaled and averaged and the SSI payment determined accordingly.

Sometimes, Pigsley said, this caused an unfair burden for a person whose income changed late in a calendar quarter. The changed income counted for all three months of the quarter and, as a result, the person had an over-payment which had to be repaid or deducted from subsequent payments.

Starting this month under the new law, SSI payments will be figured on a person's past month's income and resources. That month will be two months before the payment month.

For example, the income a person had in February

will be used to figure how much he or she is due for April. March income will count for May's payment, and so on.

This will help reduce the number of over-payments that have occurred in the past, Pigsley said. It is even more important that people receiving SSI payments make prompt reports of any change in their income, resources, living arrangements or disability status.

People should also remember that any change in income will result in their SSI payment being affected two months later

and budget their fund accordingly.

SSI is a federal program that provides a basic cash income for people in need who are 65 or older, blind or disabled. Although SSI is administered by Social Security, funds for the payments come from federal general revenues, not Social Security taxes.

County benefits from PGE taxes

Clackamas is among 12 Oregon counties billing Portland General Electric Company for approximately \$10.9 million in additional property taxes and interest.

Another six counties will refund approximately \$557,000 to the company for taxes previously paid, with interest. The additional taxes and refunds resulted from the settlement of a dispute over the value of company property in those counties.

Clackamas County stands to collect approximately \$1.56 million from the deal.

PGE and the Oregon Department of Revenue, which appraises Oregon utility property, agreed on values to be used for tax years 1978-80. After the

legal agreement, counties began recomputing tax levies based on changes in PGE property values in each county.

Additional taxes resulted from state law requiring a

county to tax only un-contested—or lower—property value during an appeal when the disputed amount is more than one-quarter of 1 percent of the total value in

that county. PGE electric service property in Oregon, such as generating facilities, substations, poles and lines, is covered by the settlement.
