## Pest war wages on

All gardeners fight a continuing battle with pest insects during the growing season. For gardeners who choose to grow vegetables the organic way, winning the war against these pests calls for special strategy.  
 "There are several cultural practices organic gardeners can use to control insects, but none is fool-proof," says Ray McNeilan, Oregon State University extension home gardening agent. "All organic insect control methods require extra labor from the gardener."  
 Vegetables that are more susceptible to insect attack than others should be avoided by organic gardeners, McNeilan recommends. These include cole crops such as radishes, cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli and turnips, and root crops such as potatoes and carrots.  
 Garden crops such as beans, peas, chard, spinach, squashes and cucumbers are more insect tolerant, according to McNeilan.  
 Insect infestations can be isolated and damage limited by interplanting several crops in the same row instead of planting crops in separate solid blocks. If infestations aren't severe, insects can be individually handpicked and destroyed.  
 Protect tomato plants from tomato cutworms by placing collars made of stiff paper around the plant stems. The collars should extend one inch below and two inches above the soil surface.  
 Square pieces of heavy cardboard placed on the ground around the bases of cabbage plants will help protect them against root maggots. Cut a small hole in the center of the square, then make a cut from the outside to the center of the square and place it around the base of the plant.  
 Make sure the square fits snugly around the plant base. The use of two overlapping squares may be more effective in some cases.  
 Place cloth or paper hoods, such as hot caps, over young plants. These covers not only ward off early insect attack, but preserve heat and prevent wind and hail damage to the plant.  
 Good sanitation is another important organic gardening practice, McNeilan says. Keeping the garden clear of debris helps prevent both insect infestations and outbreaks of fungus diseases that affect garden plants.  
 Many garden insects overwinter in plant debris. As soon as a garden plant is no longer producing, or wanted, spade under or put it in the compost pile.  
 Remove weeds, discarded vegetables and any other unwanted plants from the garden whenever they begin to accumulate. This plant material often harbors many types of pest insects, particularly aphids.  
 Some insects can be temporarily washed off garden plants with a strong stream of water from a garden hose. Insect infestation also can sometimes be reduced through use of a simple spray of soap and water.  
 In addition to these insect

control methods, there are several naturally derived insecticides available.

## Progress Report: Deregulation


Deregulation of the telephone industry is not something that might happen in the distant future — it's already here.
