

## Garden Clubs plant Arbor Day trees

Members of the Sandy and Wildwood Garden Clubs took advantage of the sunny weather last week and celebrated Arbor Day early at Oral Hull Park.

Club members planted a copper beech and a green split-leaf beech next to the new dormitory at the park as part of the landscaping project. Ed Dolan of Corbett joined the clubs and planted a pin oak which he donated.

Three residents at the park, Joe and Marie Webb and Lee Hodgdon, planted a 90-year-old rose bush brought from Molalla in the special Heritage Garden that is next to the dormitory's entrance.

That special garden will feature a lilac from the historic Foster House at Eagle Creek, snowdrops and grape hyacinth from the Revenue Cemetery and a tombstone rose transplanted from Arizona, according to Marge Jacoby of the Sandy Garden Club.

The dormitory itself will be dedicated Aug. 8 at the annual Oral Hull Fun Day, Mrs. Webb said.

The 24-bed facility is nearing completion, contractor Jack Rowland reported.

It will include a recreation room and kitchenette and will provide a place to stay for blind persons from throughout the country when they visit the park.

## Planning advisors sought

The city of Sandy is looking for volunteers to serve on the city's Planning Commission as advisors.

City Manager Roger Jordan said last week that the city is soliciting letters of interest from area residents who would like to work with planning the city's future.

Local ordinance controls membership criteria. An advisor must come from within the city limits or the urban growth boundary, although the percentage of non-city residents is limited.

The advisory capacity on

the Planning Commission is generally seen as a training grounds for potential commission members, Jordan said.

### WATCH FOR PEDDLERS

City officials have asked that Sandy residents be sure to ask door-to-door peddlers if they have a local business license. If a salesman fails to provide one, a resident is asked to remind the salesman that they are required by law and may be obtained at Sandy City Hall.

The reason for the license, according to Jordan, is that in case of pro-

blems reported by local residents, the city will have a record of business name and address so that the solicitor may be contacted.

### GARAGE SALES

With the advent of spring weather, city officials are reminding Sandy residents that the local sign ordinance permits offsite signs for garage sales on Saturday and Sunday only.

Because it is illegal to place a sign on a post, the city has a number of signs available to the public which may be rented for a \$5 deposit.

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
