Solar tour highlights Sandy area residences

Two Sandy homes will be featured in the fourth annual Solar Home Tour scheduled this Sunday, May 16, from 1-5 p.m.

This self-guided tour is sponsored by the OMSI Energy Center and the Columbus Solar Energy Association, and offers area residents an opportunity to inspect working active and passive solar homes in the Gresham-Sandy area.

Locally, the Fehringer residence on Le Ann Court represents a passive,

direct-gain home which stores power in a concrete slab and brick wall. A spec home, built by Dave Skelton and Sons at 40050 Gary St. is also a passive, direct-gain, but also features an active solar hot water system.

Cost is \$5 per car load and the local tour will also include a wind system, active solar home and a passive envelope home.

Tickets are available at The Sandy Post between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday.

SUHS frosh top the norm in testing

Sandy Union High School administered the California Achievement Test to members of its freshman class in April.

Comparing Sandy results with the national average, the local school fared well.

This examination measures student aptitude in reading vocabulary, comprehension, spelling, language expression, grammar and usage, and math concepts and skills.

In comparison to national average scores, Sandy High scored average and above average on 37 out of 41 item groups in the test battery.

The breakdown by percentages demonstrates that 10 percent were below average, 46 percent were average, 27 percent were high and 17 percent were very high. Test results will be used to evaluate curriculum and advise students on future programs, according to Dennis Crow, assistant principal.
