Accident ends chase down Bluff

An early-morning accident ended a high-speed run down North Bluff Road.

A juvenile was cited for attempting to elude a police officer and recklessly endangering after the car he was driving hit an embankment and rolled over just after 4 a.m. Tuesday morning. The driver and a passenger were taken to the hospital to be treated for injuries.

Police said the youth was seen leaving Jim's Big Apple and driving down Proctor Boulevard without headlights. When police attempted to stop the vehicle, the driver took off with speeds reaching 70 miles per hour.

Two other vehicles were forced off the road by the young driver during the incident.

Last Saturday, the two diesel pumps at the Sandy

Fire Hall were put out of commission when a driver backed into them and knocked them on to the pavement.

Bluee Steele, 27, of Sandy, told police he didn't see the pumps as he was backing out of the lot in a 1969 Cadillac. No citation has been issued but the incident is still under investigation.

Sunday morning, personnel at Paola's Pizza Barn reported a messy burglary

at that restaurant.

According to police reports, someone entered the business by an unknown means and took money from the cigarette machine and video game machine.

The person or persons also threw cheese around the kitchen and in the ovens. Pizza sauce was splashed on the walls and floor, and the dining room was littered with napkins and straws. Damage and loss was estimated at \$250.

Lyle Daniels

Funeral services for Sandy resident Lyle Daniels were held Tuesday, May 11, in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Vault interment followed at the Scandinavian Cemetery in Sandy.

Mr. Daniels died May 7 in Clackamas. He was 62.

Born May 17, 1919, in Blue Earth County, Minn., he was raised and educated in Minnesota. He began working as an independent trucker when he was 15.

In 1943, Mr. Daniels entered the U.S. Army and served during World War II.

After discharge in 1945 he took time off and traveled. It was during this time that he met Maude Edmison. They later married on July 7, 1948, in Idaho.

They lived in Minnesota for a short time before moving to Estacada.

Mr. Daniels began work in the logging industry when they moved to Oregon and continued until his retirement in 1971.

The Daniels' moved to the Sandy area in 1959. He was a member of an Appaloosa Horse Club and enjoyed outdoor activities such as hunting and hiking.

He is survived by his wife, Maude; children, James and Ruth Daniels, both of Sandy, David of Boardman, and Robert of Welches; his mother, Ruth Daniels of Minnesota; four grandchildren; five brothers, and one sister. He was preceded in death by a son, Dexter, in 1976.

Jack Davis

Funeral services for Jack Davis of Sandy were held at Sweeney Mortuary in Heppner. He died May 5 at the Fairlawn Nursing Home. He was 73.

Born March 10, 1909, and raised in Kentucky, he later moved to Oregon. He married Alta Baker in Mason City, Wash., in June of 1936.

Mr. Davis was a logger most of his working life. He enjoyed hunting and fishing, as well as yard work and gardening.

He wife died in 1968. He is survived by his brother, Bob of Kentland, Ind., and two daughters, Beulah Way of Sandy and Patricia Sawyer of Middletown, Conn.
