

# Ad campaign features local dealer

Chuck Jones, proprietor of Ferguson's Power Equipment in Sandy, is currently featured in testimonial picture ads in three national trade magazines.

He was selected because he is the largest single-store dealer for Echo chain saws in Oregon, an honor he's held three consecutive years. In fact, only a three-store chain headquartered in Pendleton sells more chain saws in Oregon.

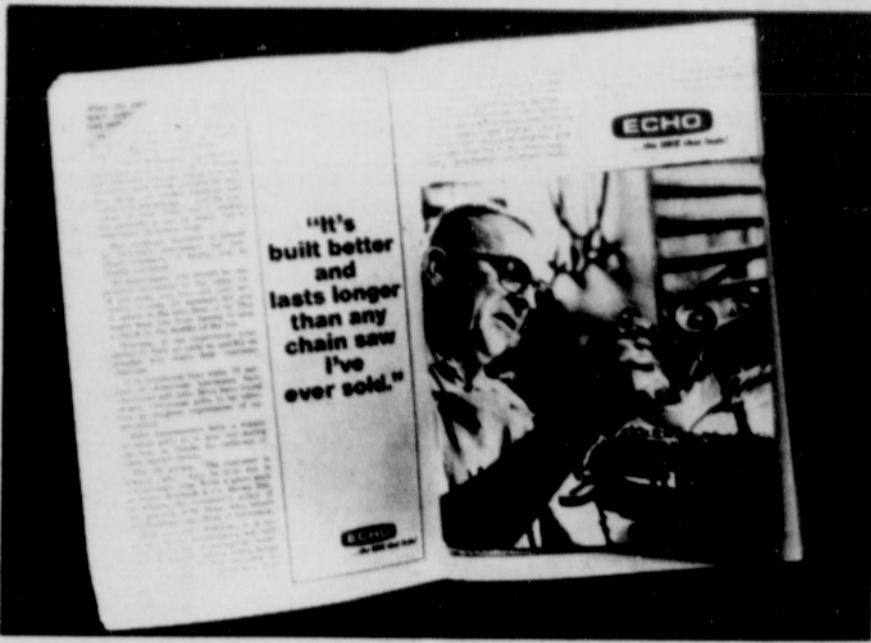
So Oregon Toro, distributor of the chain saw, sent an advertising agency photographer to Jones' Sandy shop three months ago to picture the Sandy Chamber of Commerce president at work sharpening saws.

Now his picture is showing up in big testimonial ads in dealer publications like Outdoor Power Equipment and the Portland-published Chain Saw Age.

Being held up as example for other chain saw dealers has caused his Sandy phone to ring, too.

"It's caused a lot of harassment, I can tell you that!" he chuckled.

His testimonial ad is one in a series that depicts top

chain saw shop owners around the country. Thus far, three store owners have appeared in the trade magazines, but more testimonials are expected, Jones said.

The February issue of Outdoor Power Equipment shows Sandy's 1981 retailer of the year in his shop

sharpening a saw. "He's been servicing and selling German, Swedish and American chain saws for over two decades," the ad says, "and he's seen plenty of chain saws come and go.

"Chuck Jones knows two-cycle engines."

Best of all, Jones said the agency photographer gave him originals of all his pictures the agency didn't use in the sales campaign. The only one he didn't get to keep is the photo in the three magazines, and there are thousands of copies of that picture floating around the country.

# Jaycees rechartering local chapter

The Oregon Jaycees will be working to recharter a Jaycee chapter in Sandy during the rest of May, according to Don Weston, an officer for the state Jaycee organization.

"We plan to make a commitment to Sandy to restore the active Jaycee chapter the city had up until a few years ago," Weston said.

The Sandy Jaycees were put on probation three years ago by the national Jaycee organization and their charter pulled when membership fell below the required 22 members. The Oregon Jaycees have targeted several areas in Oregon for chartering Jaycee chapters during

May, Weston said. The Jaycees are a leadership training organization that specializes in giving younger men opportunities to become involved in their community and improve their performance on the job.

Training programs include personal dynamics (career planning), leadership dynamics, communication dynamics, personal financial management, time management, family life development and speakup, a speech program that allows the individual to progress at his pace.

"The Jaycees utilize these training programs to

plan community projects," Weston said. "This gives them a chance to gain valuable experience not always available to young people in other service organizations or at work."

The Oregon Jaycees usually rely on local Jaycee chapters in nearby areas to charter new chapters. But the Sandy Jaycees will be chartered by District Director Weston, Metro Regional Director Barry Smith, Oregon membership Vice President Dayton Hyde,

and newly-elected Oregon Jaycee President Forrest Brostrom.

Weston, who said recruiting currently is underway, indicated that the chapter will be chartered with 30 members by the end of May.

The Jaycees are canvassing Sandy on an appointment system now and will announce a meeting date later in May. Anyone interested in Jaycees, between the ages of 18 and 35, may contact Weston, 761-1254.
